DECISION NOT YET REACHED.

AMSTERDAM, July 12. A Berlin despatch says the Reichstag inter-party committee concluded its deliberations with regard to the text of the joint resolution on the question of peace which is to be moved in the Reichstag. The National Liberal members of the committee requested that their party be given an opportunity to come to a decision regarding the resolution, but this decision has not yet been reached.

Women with sensitive skins often cannot go out in inclement weather. If your skin is delicate, it need not keep you from going out if you will give it reasonably good care. A coat of good skin-food cream, well rubbed in and dusted over with rice talcum powder should be applied before
