Few Clothes.

Of course the average woman never does that. It would do her no good, for she knows that it is impossible for her. She must compromise and sacrifice, some of them and the question always and over before the house is which considerations shall she sacrifice.

Among my young married friends, are two who answer this question in exactly opposite ways. I want to tell you about them.

One has a great many clothes. She is not satisfied unless in her wardrobe there is always a winter and summer suit, two or three afternoon gowns and a couple of evening gowns, several thin dresses and innumerable blouses.

She Always Has Something New. She is always surprising us by appearing at the small functions where we meet her, with something new—now a new afternoon dress, again a new hat and a very fancy pair of shoes that she bought at some bargain sale, again a blouse whose claim to distinction is the elaborate way it is trimmed. Most of the things are made of inexpensive materials and are connected at home by a none too gifted dressmaker. Inevitably they soon get shabby and out of style, which justifies her in buying more. She never sticks to any particular color scheme, says she gets tired of two or three colors, and likes to try them all.

A Suit Once In Two Years.

The other woman has comparatively few clothes, but what she has are of the best. She buys, perhaps once in two years, a first class suit of excellent tailoring and materials. To go with this she buys two thoroughly good blouses one more elaborate than the other. She wears these with her suit to the most of the afternoon and

simpler evening functions to which the other woman wears her afternoon gowns. The simpler blouse also serves when she goes shopping. Sometimes she has one semi-dressy afternoon gown for the more elaborate occasions, and always, of course, she has one good good evening gown which is bought at a first class shop and lasts her two or three years. She usually has on hand a thoroughly good but very plain coat which lasts her several years. She has had one set of furs since I knew her. She paid a price for them which the other woman thought extravagant. They still give her an air of distinction after six years wear.

She Sticks To Two Or Three Colors. In order to keep her clothes in harmony, she sticks to two or three colors which she knows are most becoming to her. Of course she has to appear in the same clothes a good many times, but they are always so attractive and she always so well groomed, that she is never hard to look at. Also she sometimes has to be rather underdressed, as for instance, in a suit and blouse at an afternoon tea where the other women wear gowns. But it is always better to be underdressed than overdressed, especially when the overdressing is of a tawdry sort.

I meant to leave it uncertain which of the two ways I liked the best. I fear I have not done so.

I wonder if you agree with me sufficiently to join me in the resolution. I have made to get fewer clothes and have them better.

Milady's Boudoir

THE PERFECT THROAT AND NECK

Many women think it incumbent upon them to paint and powder and make fair the skin of the face, powdering it to a ghastly whiteness, yet the skin of the neck and throat is left alone, and often a dark streak is allowed to appear above the V shaped or round neck. It seems a pity that such necks are seen, when the remedy is so near to find. Anyone who will, may have a well appearing throat, so long as her age is on the sunny side of fifty.

The too thin neck hints of ill health but the proper exercise will round it out and make it symmetrical. These exercises, consist of the slow and gentle rolling of the head upon the shoulders, first all the way around from right to left for several times and then reversing the motion. The bowing of the head far forward and then far back, then leaning to the right side and then to the left, these movements taken slowly and gently night after night, will develop the unused tissue which causes the neck to lack roundness.

After such exercises the flesh should be well scrubbed with hot water and soap, carefully and thoroughly massaged with cream for at least ten minutes, the cream removed and cold water applied to the glowing surface. The correct massage necessary to break down and remove fatty deposits around the throat are best given by an experienced masseuse who is familiar with anatomy. Care must be taken to keep the muscles firm and not to reduce too rapidly. Hollows can be filled in by massage and the double chin can be reduced. So there seems little excuse for the unsightly neck and throat.
