THE BOMANTIC STORY OF A GAL-LEON OF THE GREAT ARMADA. One day many years ago, a battere mory on the west coast of Scotland it was once a moble Spanish galleon. She had been one of the great Armeda but had escaped Drake's hammering in the Channel, had weathered gales that blew round the Orkneys, and now -the mere ghost of her former self crawled into the quiet waters of Tobermory, seeking a moment's respite. Her commander was desper ately in need of new material for refitting his ship, and provisions for the

eight hundred men he carried.

Now the vessel was reported and a great many people profess to be cer-tain of the fact—to have been the paymaster's ship for the whole of the Spanish fleet and to have contained in this capacity no less than thirty million ducats-a ducat was worth nearly ten shillings-besides church plate of fabulous value. COMPANIES OFFOSE CLAIM ONLY WHEN FRAUD IS SUSPECTED.

The judgment of the Court of King's Bench at Montreal absolving the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company from any claim under a life insurance policy because of false statements in the application for the insurance, serves as a warning to these insurance and undergoing

edical examination.
In this case a Dr. Bourseois, of tree Rivers. had negotiated with a Canada Life Assurance Company a policy and on the advice of a lysician he had delayed his examination on account of laryngitis. Five matten on account of laryngitis. Five menths later, it appears, he applied to the Metropolitan Life for a policy and was examined by one of the company's doctors. In reply to a question as to whether he had ever been refused or postponed for insur-ance, he answered 'Na." Subsequent-ly a policy for \$20,000 was issued on his life. Following his death the company refused to pay the claim and legal action resulted. Justice Dup-lessis awarded the widow \$20,000 but this award is reversed by the appeal. Grounds For Contesting.
