Mrs. Mary Cullen, relict of Thomas Cullen, a quarter of a century ago a pastor of the Aylmer Methodist Church, died at the home of her daughter in Toronto on Wednesday morning last. Two sons and three daughters survive her as follow: Dr. Thomas S., of Baltimore; Dr. Ernest N., of Harper's Hospital, Detroit; Mrs. James E. Beatty, Montreal; Mrs. John B. Ramsay, Baltimore; and Mrs. Edward Wallace, of Ching-tu, West China. The latter started for Toronto to visit her mother six weeks ago, sailing on the Empress of Asia, but the boat did not reach Victoria until after her mother had passed away.
