David Marshall, M.P., returned on-

Friday night from a five weeks' tripthrough Western Canada in the interests of the Dominion Canners. Mr. Marshall made a personal visit to all the principal towns and cities from Winnipeg to Vancouver, and reports that business conditions generally are very much improved. Mills which had been shut down for the past year or two are now running on full time, and the western people are greatly encouraged with future prospects. In the mining districts, all are running to full capacity. The Rossland has a monthly pay-roll of \$100,000; Trail, \$125,000; Grand Forks, \$60,000; and Phoenix, \$70,000, which would indicate prosperity in this line. With regard to farm crops, the acreage will not be so large as last year. The season is very backward, and the lovalty of the western people in enlisting to serve their King and Country will necessarily make help very scarce. Marshall found in one small village, with a male population of 67 of military age, no less than 47 joined the Colours, and are now at the Front. The business outlook for the Dominion Canners in the western provinces is most encouraging.
