JOHN BOYLE'S DEATH.

The Coroner's Jury at Chatham Decides That It Was Accidental.

Chatham, Ont., Sept. 29.—The jury empaneled to inquire into the death of John Boyle, who was at first thought to have died from injuries received during a drunken row at Morpeth, on Saturday, 19th inst., last night returned a verdict of accidental death. The evidence of Dr. Fleming and Dr. F. Bray, who made the post mortem examination, showed that Boyle had fallen from the wagon, and a wheel passed over him, fracturing all the ribs on the right side and rupturing the liver.

Evidence was also put in, showing that Boyle was sober when he left Chatham on the night of his death.

THE BATTLE MATCH.

Annual Meet of the Seventh to Take Place on Oct. 15.

Officers Elected to Carry Out Arrangements—Contest for a Gold Medal.

He has spent the past few years in foreign countries in his effort to elude United States authorities.
