### COL. CLARK'S ULTIMATUM.

He Makes a Final Offer for the Street Railway Franchise.

The City to Get a Percentage on Ecarnings-The Offer Referred to the Council-No. 1 Committee's Business.

Solicitor Johnston, representing Col. Clark, was present at a meeting of No. 1 committee last evening. He presented a final proposition. The aldermen did not wish to discuss it—they said that however it might leave their hands it was sure to be pulled to pieces in the council—and they marrly passed it on fact the council—and they

it might leave their hands it was sure to be pulled to pieces in the council—and they merely passed it on for the approval of that body.

There are three important differences between this proposition and its predecessors. Instead of providing material for pavements a percentage will be given to the city—3 per cent. on the gross earning for the first five years, 4 per cent. for the next five, and 5 per cent. for the last ten years. The arbitration for the possession of the road at the expiry of the franchise, he now proposes to base on the value of the years. The arbitration for the possession of the road at the expiry of the franchise, he now proposes to base on the value of the rolling stock, and not, as formerly, on the average amount of the earnings during the last three years of his possession. Mr. Johnston said that if the council could not give Col. Clark the exclusive right to operate by electricity a stipulation could be made that, if the London Street Railway Company were given the right to use a similar motive power, he (Col. Clark) should be bought out at a sum far in excess of the value of his line. This, he said, would make the arrangement practically exclusive. Mr. Johnston also stated that Col. Clark would be willing to give a deposit when an agreement was arrived at.
