### THE KILLING FROST.

IN CANADA.

From all parts of the country come accounts of serious damage to fruit and vegetables by the frost of Friday and Sunday nights.

Around Hamilton the frost has done

incalculable damage to fruits and garden truck. At Thorold the frost badly damaged grapes, peaches, strawberries and cherries and early vegetables. The grain
