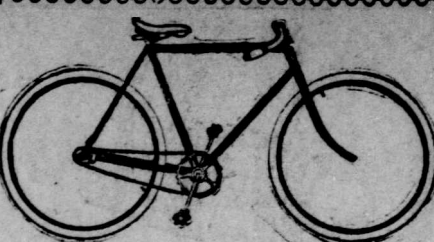

Toronto, April 23—8 p.m.—Local showers have occurred today in Quebec and rain has fallen generally over the southern portion of the Maritime Provinces. A depression attended by an extensive rain area covers the Southwest States, but it is unlikely to affect Canadian weather just at present. Minimum maximum temperatures: Victoria, 44-56; Qu'Appelle, 50-74; Winnipeg, 40-60; Port Arthur, 36-50; Parry Sound, 44-70; Toronto, 46-71; Ottawa, 48-70; Montreal, 50-64; Quebec, 34-44; Halifax, 33-42.

Local temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Monday, April 23, were: Highest, 74°; lowest, 47°5'. Today the sun rose at 5:21 a.m., and sets at 7:11 p.m. The moon rises at 2:28 a.m. and sets at 2:00 p.m.

At St. Matthew's Church, East London, the rector, George M. Cox, presided, and officers were elected. Mr. John H. Phillips was re-elected people's warden and Mr. Richard P. Honored by Englishmen
at Their Annual
Banquet.

Unity of British Empire the
Theme of the Orators.

Eloquent Addresses by Col. Culver,
Rev. Canon Dann, Joseph Gibson,
Rev. Dr. Saunders and Others.

The 33rd annual dinner of St. George's Society, which was held last night at the City Hotel, was an unqualified success, and fully equalled, if it did not totally excel, its predecessors. The dominant note struck in the address was that of fervid patriotism, of patriotism not alone to England, and to Canada, but to the whole glorious empire, of which Canada forms a not inconsiderable part. The broad spirit of the brotherhood of Britons pervaded the entire assemblage, and Ireland and her brave sons, and Scotland's sturdy soldiers received as much encomium and praise as did the land of St. George and her heroes.

Nearly one hundred guests surrounded the tables when the hour arrived for the beginning of the banquet. The room was tastefully decorated with the Union Jack, the Stars and Stripes, and the banner of the component parts of the British Empire.

Regrets at their inability to attend were received from Thos. Beattie, M. Col. F. L. Leys, M.P.P., Sir John Carling and Judge Edward Elliott.

Greetings were received from the following presidents of St. George's Society in other cities: John J. Drew, Guelph; H. A. Hodgson, Montreal; George W. Munson, Toronto; and H. Newburn, Hamilton.

After the luxurious spread provided had been disposed of, the toast list was proceeded with. "Chairman, Essery," introduced the toast of "The Queen," and first referred pithily and wittily to the various speakers who were to follow. He then asked all to join in drinking the health of that glorious monarch, that monarch to whom all other great monarchs of the world had knelt and said, "Grandma, please may we come in the back door?" The toast of "The Queen" was then drunk with great enthusiasm and the "National Anthem" was sung.

The next toast was that of "The President of the United States," and with it was coupled the name of Col. Culver, the popular United States Consul in London, who sat with them. Col. Culver first expressed his pleasure at being present, and assured his hearers that so pleasant had been his residence in London that, if he ever decided to emigrate, he would have to leave the United States, he should certainly settle here. He had often thought that if he were not an American, he would prefer to be a Canadian. Wonderful changes had occurred in the world since the last occasion on which he had sat with them. Both England and the United States had been making history at a rapid rate. Wars such as those being waged by the United States and England could not be carried out without criticism, but despite criticism, such wars must be carried to a completion. Speaking of the American nation as such, and not as individuals, he had no hesitation in saying that they, in common with the president William McKinley, were heart and soul with the British Empire in their fight for liberty in South Africa. There were men in the United States who sympathized with the Boers, but so there were in Canada, and in England, but they form in both countries a very inconsiderable part of the population. The speaker then quoted Bishop Harzel, of the Methodist Church in South Africa, to the effect that the Boers once believed that the natives had no souls, and still believe that they should be kept in slavery. The supremacy of the Dutch system in South Africa means slavery; that of the British system means liberty. "I know that the heart and brain of the United States is with Great Britain," the speaker concluded.

Vice-President Barons introduced the toast of "The Day We Celebrate." Rev. Dr. Saunders, in responding, said that perhaps never were the days of the various patron saints celebrated with more enthusiasm than now. When the First Lady of our empire had led the way on St. Patrick's Day by wearing a big bunch of shamrock, the rest of the empire had deemed it an honor to follow her example, and thereby recognize the valor and courage displayed on the battlefield by Ireland's sons. When St. Andrew's Day arrives it might well be celebrated with enthusiasm by the countrymen of Hector Macdonald, Lord Dundonald, and "Fighting" Hunter. This celebration of St. George's Day was the celebration of the patron saint of chivalry and bravery. The speaker's memory went back to the days of the first awarding of the Victoria Cross in 1857. General Roberts, he said, had won this coveted decoration no less than three times, while General Buller had won it twice. The world was looking forward to the time when the shackles of slavery

would be struck off the natives in South Africa, and every soul be free. The number of those who denied the justice of the British cause were becoming less. It was unhealthy to tell a Saxon to get off the earth, and the gathering broke up at an early hour this morning.

J. W. McIntosh then sang "Her Majesty" and responded to an encore.

Joseph Gibson, of Ingersoll, followed in response to the same toast. Col. Culver had said England had been making history at a rapid rate. When the present war was over there would be two so-called republics less in the world. Imperial federation, which was today so near realization, was once scoffed at as a dream; but what people dreamed about was generally what they were thinking of, and what they acted upon. The speaker then proceeded to give a birdseye view of the events leading up to the war. In 1884 the Boer parliament had declared that equal rights should be accorded to all, and gave a law granting outlanders the franchise after a year's residence. Before the year was up they met again and extended the period of residence to two years more, and before this time they reached they again met and made the period fourteen years, clearly indicating that they had no intention of ever granting the franchise. The speaker did not wonder at the war, but at the patience of the British people. In one year the Boer Government had taken from the outlanders \$65,000 for education, and gave back to them a pittance of £650 for a separate school, the most of the balance of the money going to buy cannon and guns to fight the British. The speaker concluded by drawing a glowing picture of the British Empire, its resources and the spirit which underlies and makes possible its greatness, and expressed the belief that it would long continue a blessing to its own people and a godsend to mankind.

The toast of "The Army, Navy and Volunteers" was introduced by ex-President R. A. Jones, and responded to by Rev. Canon Dann. The army, navy and volunteers, he said, needed very little reply from him, as they were replying for themselves. He was a minister of peace, but the best way to have peace was to be ready for war, and while tyranny and slavery exist a minister of peace must be ready to call for fighting. He was pleased especially that the speakers of the evening were not talking only of England, but of Great Britain and the British Empire. Ireland and Scotland and the colonies want to be with England in her fight. Speaking of the Canadian boys, he had it on credible authority that when George looked out from his fortifications, and saw the Canadians, he asked his aide, "Who are those fine-looking fellows?" "That's the Royal Canadian Regiment, sir." "Then it's all up! Put up the white flag." Let England but step forward half-way and she would find Ireland and her sister countries ready to step more than half-way. Let all past differences be put aside, and let all go forward as the British Empire. And wherever the cause of truth is to be maintained or liberty espoused, the Anglo-Saxon race will be found hand in hand.

R. A. Galpin rendered a song, and W. C. Goss, in the uniform of the Governor-General's Body Guards, gave a number of interesting reminiscences of Gen. Otter and Col. Buchanan. "The Senate, House of Commons and Local Legislature" were also responded to by P. H. Bartlett and J. W. Jones, and T. Treleven favored the gathering with a song. "Canada, Our Home," was responded to by W. H. Bartram and Philo E. McKenzie, who paid a graceful tribute to the Irish race, and Wm. Wanless,
