PAPAL DELEGATE

SELF-GOVERNMENT FOR OLD IRELAND

England to Give a Large Degree of Home Rule.

MANY REFORMS FOR THE PEOPLE

Government Expected to Withdraw Constabulary From the Rural Districts.

Dublin, April 27.—Not in a century have the relations between the people and the Government been so tranquil. All Ireland is convinced the Government intends at last to treat the island with justice and fairness. The Irish Government already is instituting many reforms tending to relieve the burdens of the people. All recruiting for the hated Royal Irish Constabulary has been stopped. The constabulary has been withdrawn from the rural districts and the force largely diminished and centered in the cities.

It is expected the Government intends to strip the constabulary of its quasi-military character, which has been so hateful to the Irish. The authorities at Dublin Castle have inaugurated the new policy of peace and good-will by destroying all secret societies. These records have been sent to the freedom of Irish patriots.

In the north of Ireland the people are convinced, despite the Premier's recent denial, that the Government intends introducing a sweeping measure of self-government. Complete self-government in the immediate future is improbable, but there certainly will be freer and wider local self-government.

For the first time in decades absolute peace exists between the Irish Nationalists and the British Government. Optimists are hopeful it is the prelude to home rule in the not very remote future.

FOR CHEAPER POSTAGE

British Authorities Urged to Reduce the Rates.

London, April 27.—The British Empire League yesterday passed a resolution welcoming the formation of a Dominion naval militia, as well as a resolution urging Mr. Austin Chamberlain, the Postmaster-General, to reduce the rates on English newspapers and periodicals to Canada. The latter resolution was largely due to facts presented in a Toronto letter in the Daily Chronicle, in which the heavy burden of postage was shown to be a hindrance to the circulation of British publications in Canada, and it was pointed out that the readers of the Dominion were compelled, owing to the excessive postage charged on British periodicals, to avail themselves of American publications, and were thus taught to view the affairs of the world through United States eyes.

APPLES A LUXURY

Shippers Urged to Abandon Use of Barrels.

London, April 27.—Peter Ball, Canadian agent in the Midlands, states that English merchants are keen to know how to do business with Canada. Mr. Ball thinks that the Canadian apple shippers ought to abandon the use of barrels, and adopt instead bushel boxes, with each apple wrapped in paper. Apples are a luxury in England, and nothing common is so valued. He suggested to see a barrel of Canadian apples in Birmingham, which was bad in the middle. He considers that there are splendid openings for canned and tinned fruits in the Dominion. The Americans have now got the market. Mr. Ball advocates the establishment of storage warehouses in the principal centers.

MAFIA IN NEW JERSEY

Terror-Stricken Newark Italians Arm Themselves.

Newark, N. J., April 27.—Italians of this city, it is reported, have bought up all the second-hand revolvers and guns they could get during the past few days. They, it is said, have armed themselves, fearing the Mafia, to which the several Italian churches are addressed their congregations, urging them to be careful, compose themselves and not do anything rash. The Italian districts are being patrolled by a double force of policemen, who are under orders to arrest all suspicious-looking persons.

MIXED WEATHER IN STORE FOR US

Tornadoes, Extreme Heat and Humidity for May.

PREDICTED BY REV. MR. HICKS

Don't Plant Too Soon and Take Precautions Against Electrical Storms.

St. Louis, April 27.—Rev. Ira R. Hicks, the noted weather prophet of the south, foretells May to be a month of changeable days and not all sunshine and warmth. He does not predict any severe cold, however, although wild storms may now and then sweep over the country.

Among his practical hints he says that in all northern and middle sections people should not be in a hurry to plant bottom lands, unless they are above high water, sandy and well drained. He further warns his hearers to let nothing prevent them from making every possible preparation for dangerous tornadoic storms.

His predictions according to each storm period are given in the following remarks:

A regular storm period is central on May 1, having its first stages in the last days of April, and reaching to May 4. By the 1st the "cloud and storm" area of this period will be organized, rains will be in progress in the west, and during the 2nd to 4th these storms will move eastward across the country. They will be preceded by warmer weather and falling barometer, the byrometer also showing above normal humidity. Rain, lightning and thunder will occupy the middle section of the general storm movement to the east, while rising barometer, falling temperature and clearing skies will bring up the rear.

For the second storm period, which the prophet predicts winds, mugginess, high humidity, change to much warmer and falling barometer may be expected at the out-start and storm clouds, rain and thunder will quickly follow, passing rapidly eastward across the country from the 6th to the 8th. If winds do not change to westerly and cooler, the storm will follow in many places to the northward.

The third storm period runs from the 10th to the 14th, and an unusual wave for the season will begin in the west on or about the 10th. Winds generally will be easterly and southerly, loaded with much humidity. From about Monday the 11th, Thursday, the 14th, breaking into violent storms of wind, rain and thunder, will traverse the country from the western prairies to the Atlantic.

When the general storm conditions break up, the barometer will rise quite high, winds will change to westerly and frosts will fall in many localities northward.

Following this period, a sudden change to very warm will be noted. A low drop of the barometer, with black, foreboding heavy rain, thunder and stiff squalls of wind will be natural, on and about the 17th and 18th. A quick and sharp change to much cooler will also be natural immediately after these storms.

The fifth and last storm period is central on the 24th, covering two to four days on and after that date. It promises to be a prolonged time if disturbed and threatening weather. On the 21st the weather conditions will break into electrical storms and the indications are that a storm center will gather in the west every afternoon and evening for several days, sending a series of storm pulsations across the country.

When the storm conditions break up, the culminating crisis will fall on or next to the 26th, the date of the new moon. Very cool weather, with possible frost in the north, will follow when the storm conditions break up.

The last three days of May, continues the prophet, should, in the regular order, bring on reactionary storm conditions with more disturbed and stormy weather. But the results at this time will depend upon the nature of disturbances at the last regular period. If they prove to be too severe and long-continued, the elements will hardly react into storm conditions in the closing days of the month. Otherwise the 26th to 31st will bring low barometer, warm weather and more rain and storminess.

DEAD IN HIS BARN

Lifeless Body of a Huron Township Farmer Found.

Kincardine, Ont., April 27.—Mr. Alex. McCosh, a farmer living on the Lake Shore Range, Huron township, was found dead in his barn Saturday. It is presumed that he had fallen in a fainting fit while feeding his stock. He had been dead for some days when found. He was married, and lived alone. Mr. McCosh was a native of Ayrshire and was a prominent member of St. Andrew's Society.

KILLED AT THROTTLE

A Port Huron Engineer Meets Death in Collision.

Detroit, April 27.—A special from Lenox, Mich., says: In a collision between a Grand Trunk passenger train and a local freight near here, two men were killed and one injured. The dead—Leonard Neill, engineer, Port Huron, and P. Patterson, engineer, Detroit.

Injured—John Whiting, fireman, Port Huron. The accident was the result of an open switch that allowed the passenger train, while going at the rate of 25 miles an hour, to enter the siding, on which the freight train was standing. The passenger train was thrown into a panic and a number whose names are not given slightly injured. The body of Engineer Neill was found at his post with his hand on the throttle.

BRITAIN AND VENEZUELA

England May Pay Cost of Blockade to Facilitate Matters.

London, April 27.—The new British note concerning Venezuela merely provides details in the matter of the joint commissions, which is to sit at Caracas. 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THE SMALLPOX MICROBE

A Boston Physician Claims to Have Located It.

Boston, April 27.—The Globe announces that Dr. William Thomas Cowan, of the Shumway professor of pathological anatomy at Harvard Medical School, has discovered the germ that causes smallpox. The discovery is pronounced by physicians who have been made aware of Dr. Cowan's achievements as one of the really great ones in medical history, and the most important made in Boston, giving the discovery of either as an anaesthetic. The details of the investigation, how each successive step was taken, together with valuable scientific information concerning the microbe, the organism that produces that highly contagious disease, will on Tuesday evening be furnished to medical men by the discoverer, who reports that he has secured the microbe in a pure form, and has been able to announce the scientific world.

VANDERBILT WEDDING

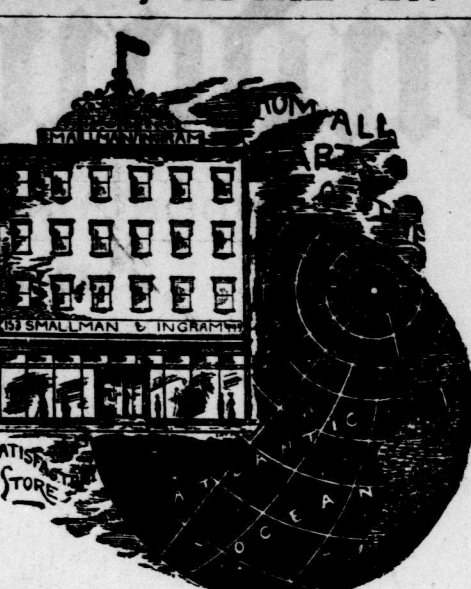
Celebrated in St. Mark's Church at London.

London, April 27.—William K. Vanderbilt and Mrs. Anna Rutherford were married Saturday at St. Mark's Church, North Audley street. The officiating clergyman was the Rev. R. H. Hadden. The wedding occurred for some time. It seems that Mr. Vanderbilt personally secured the license and managed the whole affair himself. STRIKE ON M. C. R.

Sectionmen on Canada Southern Division Are Out.

St. Thomas, April 27.—Saturday morning the trackmen on the Canada Southern division of the Michigan Central Railway went out on strike. Nearly all the sectionmen on the east end are out, and the majority on the west. The men are demanding an increase in their pay—the present wage is \$1.30 per day and the men are asking for \$1.40. The officials of the company say their road is equivalent to that paid by other lines in this part of the country. None of the foremen are in demand, and the trackmen are in a very great extent. Although labor is very scarce in this vicinity it is not thought that the railway people will yield to the demands of the strikers. The trackmen chose an extremely good time, as the freight business is very heavy.
