MILLION DEAD OF PLAGUE

The Startling Record of India Since September, 1896.

536,600 Victims in Bombay—Increase in Other Presidencies.

London, June 23.—A government statement regarding the condition of India in respect to plague from its first outbreak in Bombay in September, 1896, to March, 1902, shows a total of reported deaths from the disease during that period of 536,600 in the Bombay Presidency, and 315,409 in other parts of India, or a total of 852,009 for the whole of British India and the native states. Making allowance for untraced and unreported deaths it is calculated that a million died during the period mentioned.

During the first three months of 1902 the deaths reported in the Bombay Presidency were 62,667, compared with 17,806 in the corresponding period of 1901. Other parts of India show a corresponding increase, especially in the Punjab, where the deaths in 1900 were 545, in 1901, 15,245, while in the first months of 1902 the figures have risen enormously. The deaths reported in March alone numbered 42,788.

DROWNED IN SIGHT
OF HUNDREDS!

Four Boys in a Boat That Capized a Pleasure Resort.

St. Louis, Mo., June 22.—Four boys were drowned this evening by the capsizing of a boat at Fern Glen, a resort fifteen miles from here. They were:

Eddie Flynn, 17 years old.
Robert Rogan, 16 years old.
Peter Parkin, 17 years old.
Alphonse Keaton, 18 years old.

The drowning occurred at the annual picnic of the St. Louis Turnverein. The boys were rowing in a skiff on the Mississippi River when it capsized, and the occupants were thrown out. Hundreds of people on the shore saw the boys struggling in the water, but were unable to rescue them.

SOUTH OXFORD LIBERALS' ANNUAL GATHERING

Dr. McKay Discusses the Cause of Defeat—Prohibition Vote.

Woodstock, June 22.—The Liberals of South Oxford held their annual meeting at Mount Elgin Friday. There was a large attendance from all parts of the riding. The following officers were elected: President, C. E. Burgess; vice-president, Alex. Rose; secretary, George W. H. Hare; treasurer, Dr. McKay, the late member for the riding, discussed the causes of his defeat. It was not true, he said, to lack of exertion on his part.

A vital matter at issue was the prohibition question, and he was assured that he had lost 400 votes of Liberal prohibitionists. He has lost the support of the liquor men on account of his refusal to pledge himself to follow the course they had asked. He could prove that money had been sent into the riding by such men as Seagram, Walker, Corby and Gooderham to fight him.

AUGUSTUS NINHAM KILLED
NEAR THE WOODBINE HOTEL

Another Indian Says Deed Was Done by a White Man.

NO ARRESTS HAVE BEEN MADE

Companion of Dead Man Tells Story of a Midnight Fight That Ended Fatally.

Augustus Ninham, an Oneida Indian, was foully and brutally murdered sometime between midnight Saturday and 1 o'clock Sunday morning, on the sidewalk near Hugh Sharkey's hotel, formerly the Burns House, not far from Wonderland.

High Constable McLoud and County Constable Robert Ward have worked upon the case since the murder was committed, but have not as yet secured evidence which might lead to an arrest. They acknowledge that their suspicions point in a certain direction, but both officers have been extremely reticent.

KILLED BY WHITE MAN.

The death of Ninham was undoubtedly the end of a day's carousal in which he was joined by others of his tribe, but it does not appear that it was caused by any of his companions. From the story of the one man who was with him at the time, it would seem that he was killed by a white man who had been at the hotel, who attacked Ninham and kicked and struck him until he died.

The scene of the murder is well known to the people of London. It is only sixty paces from the Pipe Line road, one of the most used thoroughfares in the county of Middlesex. At this time of the year the traffic along the Pipe Line road is unusually heavy. This roadway leads to Woodland Cemetery, and skirts the river down to Springbank and out beyond to one

of the most thickly populated and prosperous sections of the county. On summer evenings it is used very largely by people from the city, driving or wheeling to Springbank, as well as by farmers passing home after a visit to the town. The country in the immediate neighborhood of Woodbank, which is the postoffice name of the corner where Sharkey's hotel is, is strikingly beautiful and from the hotel itself a view can be obtained, of rice fields and woodlands, of the winding Thames and heavily-forested hills, that is unequalled in this portion of Ontario. A spring of pure water flows continually by the side of the hotel and it may have an important bearing upon the awful occurrence of Sunday morning. The natural beauty of their surroundings had little attraction for the people who went there yesterday. They were impelled by the ever-existing curiosity that is displayed under such circumstances. Crowds of men and boys drove, wheeled and walked to the place where the murder was committed, and spent the afternoon in searching for evidence of the death-compassing affair and listening with morbid interest to those who had learned more of it than they themselves had.

INDIAN BERRY PICKERS.

Some eight or nine miles or thereabouts from Woodbank is the reservation for the Oneida Indians, whose chief is John Ninham, first cousin of the murdered man. Year after year a large number of these Indians, with their wives and children, go from the reservation when the strawberries ripen, and pick the fruit for Mr. Charles Wesley Baker, from whose farm thousands of boxes are sold each summer. Mr. Baker lives off the side road that runs at right angles to the Pipe Line road and after cutting Black Street, leads on to Lambeth. North of the Pipe Line this road runs to the river and it is near it that the stopping place for the Springbank cars, known formerly as the Burns' House station, is located. Mr. Baker's house is not very far from Black street, and when the Indians are berry-picking for him they live altogether in the big barn at the rear of his dwelling. Augustus Ninham had been here berry-picking for some time. He was a married man. (Continued on page 2.)

TORONTO STREET CAR STRIKE
WAS SETTLED THIS MORNING

Good Work Done by the Board of Trade.

AN AGREEMENT SIGNED TODAY

Material Concessions Made—Cars To Be Run at Once—Action of Col. Buchanan Disapproved.

LONDON HUSSARS ON HAND.

Toronto, June 22.—The cavalry from Niagara arrived at 7 o'clock this morning and detained them at the western cattle market. One hundred and sixty-six men of the 1st Hussars, of London, also arrived this morning and are now drawn up at the armories, awaiting further orders. Detachments of the various city regiments are also assembled at the armories.

CARS DIDN'T START.

No cars were run this morning, pending arrangements for military protection.

The conference at the office of the street railway adjourned at 7 a. m. without any settlement having been reached.

SETTLEMENT REACHED.

CONCESSIONS MADE.

Later—Business Agent McDonald, of the Street Railway Men's Union, is quoted as saying that the strike has been settled, the company yielding all of the men's demands, including recognition of the union and increased wages.

Toronto, June 23.—The street car strike is settled. At noon A. E. Ames and J. W. Flavelle, of the board of trade, announced that an agreement had been reached on all the main points in dispute, and that the

STRIKE WAS PRACTICALLY SETTLED.

The agreement, which concedes the 18 cents asked for first-year men, and 20 cents for all men over one year's service, will be formally signed this afternoon early, and cars will be run later in the afternoon.

A GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE.

The claim of the men for a grievance

and that so far as he could learn, no member of the union had been concerned in deeds of violence.

Mr. Dilworth said that the company had at present not more than 200 men. These came from London, Hamilton, Kingston, Detroit and Buffalo. Twenty-five men brought in by the company were present at the union meeting in the afternoon. The men from Buffalo had revolvers and slung-shots and were not at all desirable citizens.

"Special constables were unanimously decided to be of no use, if obtainable. The only resort was to call in the aid of the military, who were trained and could be relied on to fulfill their duty."

ATTACK ON EAST END BARN.

At 10 o'clock last night there was a single whole party glass in the windows in the long main building front of the car barns on Queen street east, every one having been broken by a mob of sympathizers of the strikers. An attempt to storm the barns

was averted by the timely arrival of police reinforcements, but in spite of the efforts of 50 or 60 officers it was nearly 11 o'clock before the streets in the vicinity were cleared.

MESSAGE FROM SOUTH AFRICA TO KING EDWARD

Col. Hamilton Conveyed It to Windsor Castle—Boers and Britons Friends Again.

London, June 23.—Col. Hubert Hamilton, who was entrusted to bring home the original South African peace agreement, delivered the historic document signed by the Boers to King Edward at Windsor Castle Saturday. Col. Hamilton remained at the castle for dinner, at which Sousa's march, "Imperial Eagle," was played for the first time by the band of the Scots Guards. A handsome illuminated vellum copy of the march has been presented to the King.

Lord Milner, British high commissioner in South Africa, took the oath as governor of the Transvaal at Pretoria in the presence of a large assemblage of people, on Saturday. The governor was heartily cheered by those present, and a salute in his honor was fired from the forts.

SIR WILFRID IN LONDON THE TROUBLE IN IRELAND

Arrival of the Premier at the British Capital.

He Had an Enthusiastic Reception at Liverpool.

Liverpool, June 21.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada, who comes to England to attend the conference of colonial premiers and to be present at the coronation ceremonies, arrived here to-night on the Cunard Line Etruria, from New York, and started for London.

IN LONDON.

London, June 23, 6 a. m.—Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier, accompanied by Lord Strathcona, arrived at Euston station early yesterday morning and at once drove to the Hotel Cecil. The Canadian premier had a very enthusiastic reception in Liverpool, and the lord mayor of that city vainly requested him to remain there for a day or two. So far Sir Wilfrid Laurier has succeeded in resisting all efforts of interviewers and has decided not to make any statement on the subject of the colonial conference.

A LITTLE LATE.

Sir Gordon Sprigg reached London in time for the colonial feast at the Alexandra Palace, but Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier Rouse and other visitors were less fortunate, not arriving in Liverpool until late in the evening. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's first word, on the subject of preferential trade is awaited with peculiar interest by those who are sorely disappointed by Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's action respecting the haise duty and by Mr. Barton's coolness in discussing the imperial Zollverein.
