

A week ago last Saturday the tug Reid stopped off the island and blew whistles, but received no answer from the lightkeepers. A heavy sea was running and the tug could not make a landing. The tug ran to the Soo for supplies and with the Boynton returned and renewed the search. Both boats were driven to shelter behind Whitefish point by storms and last Tuesday made another attempt, but received no answering signals from

> the lighthouse Not until yesterday were the tugs able to get near the island and a small boat from the Reid was then sent ashore and the two keepers were found, snug as bugs in a rug, with plenty to eat and a great pile of wood for fire to keep themselves

Demers and Pelletier had seen the two tugs both times they attempted to reach the island but did not answerthe signals, thinking the tugs would make a landing if they were after the keepers.
