

This is the disease which a number of years ago wiped out many of the vinevards in the Essex and Kent districts, and forced many growers to give up raising grapes. In its November issue the Canadian Horticulturist will pubish a special report from Prof. Lochhead, of Guelph, who recently visited

the vineyards of Ohio to see if the fruit growers of that state had any remedy for the disease. It is announced that Ohio fruit growers have been able to control the disease by an application of a special spraying mixture at certain stages of its growth.
