Far and Near"BILL" GRANT MUST RESIGN AS
SECRETARY OF GARRISON ASS'N

Toronto, Nov. 7.—The Toronto News says: The first hard blow resulting from the disqualification of the members of the Argonaut Rugby Club has been felt by the Garrison Athletic Association.

Bill Grant, the present secretary-treasurer of the association, is one of the disqualified players, and is forced to sever his connection with the G. A. A. as an executive officer.

Sergt. R. H. Nichols, vice-president of the association, stated this morning that he had received a letter from Secretary Crow, of the C. A. A. U., to the effect that the members of the Interprovincial Union were barred, and therefore the G. A. A. do not intend to lose Grant's services and are getting over the matter by appointing him physical director at a nominal salary of about \$5 a year.

AN IN-AND-OUT PRO.

In addition to being secretary-treasurer of the G. A. A., Grant is also treasurer of the Indoor Baseball League, but as the latter is strictly a military organization the G. A. A. officials claim that he will be able to hold this position.

Grant himself is not worrying much over the outcome, as he claims that it is all the same to him, amateur or professional, but his loss will be hard felt around the armories, where he is one of the hard workers in both athlete and military matters.

His acceptance of the position of physical director will make him an out-and-out professional, and the question which most naturally arises is will the Interprovincial Rugby League allow Grant to play Rugby when he becomes a full-fledged physical director.

According to their claim that non-amateurs can play in the league, Grant would bar himself by accepting the position tendered him.

INTERMEDIATES ARE BARRED.

In the Interprovincial Rugby circles the impression is still abroad that the ruling of the C. A. A. U. referred to yesterday will not apply to the intermediate series. President Starks says that it will. The amateur law is quite clear on the point: No member of a club having disqualified men on its roll can compete in any athletic meet held under C. A. A. U. sanction. All four clubs in the Interprovincial Union have disqualified men in their membership.

An Energetic Army Medical Corps Man Heads Indoor Baseball League.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—The Garrison Indoor Baseball League, the largest in the world, met last night in the Armories, when the following amendments were carried and officers were elected:

Any man wishing to go to attach himself must notify the executive in writing previous to league opening.

The said league shall be under the jurisdiction of the Toronto Garrison Athletic Association, and shall be known as the baseball section of that organization, and shall be run con-

MONTREAL TEAM
WORKING HARD

Expect That Ottawa Will Prove Hardest Proposition of Season Saturday

Montreal, Nov. 7.—Montreal lined out for a stiff practice in the early hours of the morning today, and put up one of the best preliminary "goes" they have had for some time. The men are all in the pink of condition, confident and trained right down to time. Reports from Ottawa say that the team there is rounding into better shape every day, too, so it is needless to say that which ever team wins here on Saturday will have to work for it.

H. C. Griffith and Dr. A. B. Wright have been suggested as officials for the match, both teams being agreeable and if they will accept, it is understood that everybody will be entirely satisfied.

It is hard to say just at present what the line-up of the two teams will be, but Montreal feels sure that, barring accidents between now and the time the team goes on the field, they will put out as strong an aggregation as has walked across a gridiron in many a long day. Last night they were out for their first signal practice of the week, when all the senior players turned out with the exception of Babe Reynolds, the outside wing, and Percy Roberts, the scrumming. The latter was out in the afternoon, and did not put in an appearance at night, owing to business demands. Stephens, last year's McGill captain, was out and went through some hard work in preparation for the coming match.

Kelly was out for the first time in two weeks, contenting himself with easy work. Lesser, whose ankle was sprained in a car accident, is getting better, and was able to come out on the field. Captain Craig did not go out with the boys, Chaucer Elliott giving the signals and coaching the players in their various plays. He has devised a couple of modifications to old plays which should prove a puzzle to the Ottawa line. In the workout last night Stephens took the inside wing position, while Walter Small went to outside in place of Babe Reynolds. Kelly filling his accustomed position at left inside wing. Neither Gilmor nor Fogg was out, the latter stating that he has finished with rugby for the season.

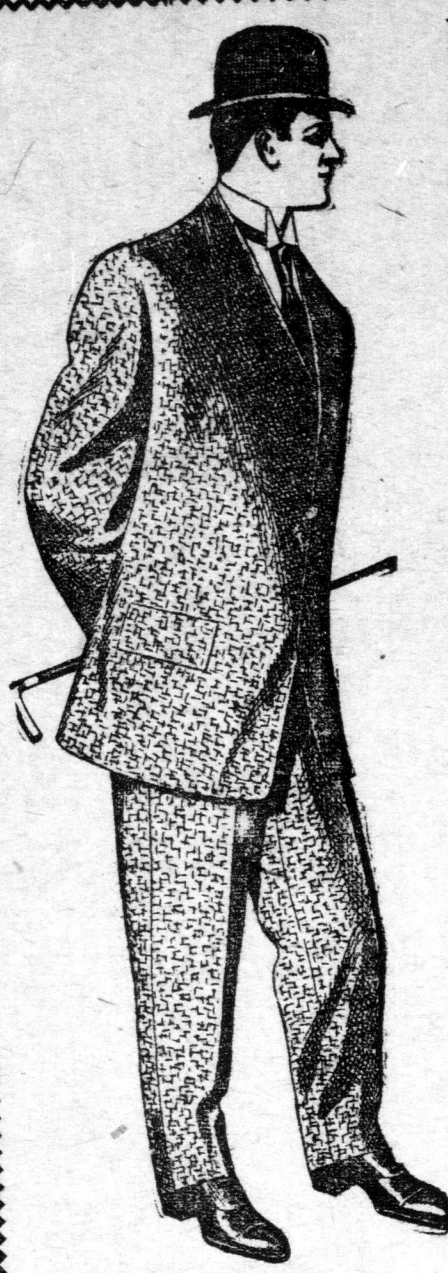

THEY WANT HOME- AND-HOME GAMES

Renfrew's Challenge Accepted for Stanley Cup—Ask New Conditions.

Renfrew, Nov. 7.—The acceptance of Renfrew's challenge for the Stanley Cup has been received by the management this week from the trustees of the silverware. The suggestion of Renfrew playing a sudden-death game with the Vics on Saturday, ice will not be accepted on any conditions by Renfrew, unless it can be arranged to play home-and-home games, the highest score to count, the idea of playing for the mug will be given up. It is thought, however, that this arrangement can be made between the rangers and the Vics if they play their two teams, and if the Vics play their legitimate lineup, as they could perhaps easily not do, there ought scarcely to be any trouble in Renfrew's playing off with the Wanderers for the cup.

Renfrew seems to be the only team in the Ottawa Valley that has yet begun to talk hockey, and from what can be learned at present, although it is perhaps somewhat early, there does not seem to be much chance of the formation of the Upper Ottawa Valley Hockey League. Of course, the league only consisted last season of the three towns, Renfrew, Arnprior and Ottawa, and during the coming season, it will mean that Renfrew will be the only team with an organized team, consequently no league will be formed. There is talk of Renfrew trying for a place in the Federal League, and it is said that they may get in. No steps, however, have been taken along this line yet, as there is considerable time before the commencement of the hockey season.
