Those present were Ald. Stewart, Ald. Booth, Ald. Garry, Ald. Rose, City Engineer Graydon, City Architect Nutter, Mr. S. S. Searson, chairman of the hospital trust, Superintendent Heard, and Secretary Baker.

Mergenthaler Was Enjoying a Walk

After being absent for nearly three hours from Victoria Hospital yesterday afternoon, Selkirk Mergenthaler, the young Swiss tailor, whom it was reported to the police had escaped, walked quietly back to the hospital and was somewhat astonished to find the active search that we being made for him.

Guarantees Can Be Secured All Right

There seems to be some difference of opinion regarding contractors' ability to get a ten-year guarantee for pavements from a guarantee company. Some time ago, Messrs. Blight & Fielder, contractors for the Carling street pavement, notified the committee that it was impossible to get a ten-year guarantee for the work, and offered to compromise by giving a five-year guarantee bond, and their personal bond for the remaining five years.

Barbers Can Do It.

Since that time, however, the Barber Company states, that a ten-year guarantee can be obtained.

Some of the aldermen heard of this, and the whole matter must now be investigated.

"The Barber Asphalt Company's agents say that the paving companies can get a ten-year guarantee," said Ald. Rose. "We were told by Blight & Fielder that they could not. Now we must have these men here to explain. We must protect the citizens."

"The contractors are trying to get out of it just like they did the King street contract," said Ald. Stewart.

The matter was laid over until the next meeting of the board to give Blight & Fielder an opportunity to explain.

Students Had Fun With a Wagon

An exciting runaway occurred on Dufferin avenue early this morning in which the horse, drawing the wagon of M. Ross, the well-known milk dealer, and a number of milk cans played the principal parts.

The horse got frightened some place in the East End and started down Dufferin avenue at a lively pace. After going a couple of blocks the swaying of the wagon caused one of the cans to fall out.

The can fell with considerable noise and the milk in it ran all about the road. The noise frightened the horse and made it faster, and it wasn't long before another can fell out.

By the time the horse reached Waterloo street all the cans were out, and there were a number of pools of milk at intervals along the street. The horse was captured in front of the Collegiate Institute.
