BIG OTTAWA MEETING
SELECTS CANDIDATES

Messrs. H. B. McGivern and J. A. Pinard
Nominated by Liberals.
Ottawa, Aug. 8.—The largest and
most representative Liberal conven-
tion ever held in Ottawa tonight chose
Messrs. H. B. McGivern, M. P., and
J. A. Pinard as candidates for the
federal elections.

Mr. McGivern was chosen unani-
mously as the English-speaking can-
didate. Four names were balloted
upon in making the choice of the
French-speaking candidate. Mr. Pin-
ard was chosen on the first ballot, re-
ceiving 216 votes, while Oscar Provost
received 131, A. E. Provost 68
and Aid. Lapointe 11. Messrs. Mc-
Givern and Pinard briefly thanked
the convention for having chosen them.

A CUP FOR GAYNOR.
New York, Aug. 9.—Just a year ago
Mayor Gaynor was shot by James Ga-
lagher as he came out of his hotel for
Europe on the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm
der Grosse. Gaynor's friends celebrated
his escape from death and returning
health by giving him a silver loving cup
five feet high, and making the presenta-
tion an occasion for considerable cere-
mony. Letters of congratulations were
received from more than a hundred
mayors from Canada, Europe and the
United States.

SPLENDID LIBERAL RALLY

Immediately so that the farmers of
Canada should reap at once the benefits
of high prices for their crop."

One for Whitney.
Mr. Elliott criticized the resolution
introduced into the Ontario House by
James Whitney against reciprocity.
The Premier had endeavored to criti-
cize the Government for its policy, but
had paid it a great compliment by
wanting that Canada's prosperity was
due to wise legislation, and it would
be foolish to interfere with the ex-
isting order of things. He stood for
the present conditions against reciprocity.
The Government to leave things as they
were at the present time. The Liberal
party, however, being the party
opposed to the Government, would
secure larger and better markets for
the produce of the farms.

Lobo Cattle.
"Lobo grows and sells many cattle,"
said Mr. Elliott. I want to call to
your recollection the conditions prior
to 1896 and the present time. Under
the Conservative regime the farmers were
in a desperate state. The many farm-
ers who had been ruined by the mortgage
under the Liberal administration,
everything had prospered, and the peo-
ple were happy and contented.

That Mutton Bogey.
Mr. A. W. Smith was given a cordial
reception when he arose. After a brief
introduction, he took the Toronto
World's article to the effect that the
sheep industry of Canada would be
ruined if the past passed, and showed
how fallacious was the statement.
He declared that it was true that 20,000
sheep had been sold in Canada recently,
but this had been due to a curious com-
bination of circumstances. The range
in the Western States were being
broken up, and many of the sheep
broken up had failed and hun-
dreds were compelled to go out of busi-

ness. As a result, thousands of sheep
were thrown on the market at once, and
prices dropped. Thousands came to Can-
ada and were sold here. The animals
sold were of smaller type, and in the hot
weather the small sheep sells for the
better price. The balance of trade was
true. In 1910 Canada imported 24,000
sheep, but exported 15,000. Conditions
would remain that way this year, and so
long as Canada sent fifteen times as
many sheep to the United States as were
brought here, there would be no reason
to complain.

Mr. Smith pointed out that this kind
of sheep would not compete with Can-
adian sheep. The latter were largely
thoroughbred, and were shipped in large
numbers to the American side for im-
proving the breeds. This trade would
not be interfered with by any such cir-
cumstances as was apparent in this year's
influx of American mutton. North Mid-
dlesex was also a great breeder in
thoroughbred sheep, and was com-
pelled to export to the United States. The
sheep of this breed would make
great profits out of them.

"These sheep do not come into com-
petition with our sheep," declared Mr.
Smith. "We are raising too profitable a
crop in the better type of animal to be
used for breeding purposes."
North Middlesex was also a great
breeder of sheep, and was com-
pelled to export to the United States. The
farmers would receive from \$1 to
\$1.10 a bushel for this grain, where now
they receive but 60 or 65 cents.

Minister of Agriculture.
Hon. Sidney Fisher was given a great
reception on arising. He congratulated
North Middlesex on having so valuable
a representative on the subject of mutton
pertaining to agriculture. He was
particularly well posted, and had given
the minister great assistance in the de-
bate. He pointed out that there were
many practical farmers in the House
at the present time.

Forced to the Country.
"The Government is forced to the
country," declared Mr. Fisher. "The
large majority of the House of Com-
mons, and I am convinced, of the
people of Canada recognize as the
ablest whip the party has ever had."

Mr. Guthrie then explained the rea-
son for the bringing on of the pre-
sent election, stating that it was due
to the stubborn tactics of the Con-
servative party and their long-winded
speeches, which he called a hold-up.

He then went on to explain the great
question at issue—reciprocity.
"The Liberals have a right to pass
reciprocity," said he, "and if it will be
ratified by the people of Canada, why do
the Conservatives oppose it so strongly
when they know that should the bill
carry under this condition that the Lib-
eral Government would be very short-
lived? But no, they are afraid. They
know it is a good bargain and when the
people have had a few years of it and
another election is called on and the
returns are brought in, there will not be
enough Conservatives elected to fill the
front benches in the House of Commons."
(Applause.)

Mr. Guthrie then referred to the atti-
tude of the Conservative press when the
bill was first brought up, and how the
Conservative press was so loud in its
praises of the measure. He then gave
some illustrations of the way in which
the Conservative press had been re-
sponsible for the failure of the bill.

Why is it, said he, "presidents of
our churches and banks can tell you
that they have earned savings of our people to New
York and there corner the money market
making short loans at high rates of in-
terest, and then come back to Canada
and declare large dividends to their
shareholders, and yet when a farmer
sells his produce in the United States
and brings the money back to Canada
he is called disloyal?" (Cheers.)

The capitalist, said he, will be the
only person affected by reciprocity, and
the ordinary people will see the benefit.
Mr. Guthrie then dealt with the effect
reciprocity would have on the cattle and
hog market, showing clearly by illustra-
tion where the farmer of Canada is con-
tinually losing money on account of the
duty imposed by the United States on
Canadian beef. Here, again, the cap-
italist would be affected and the large
dividends paid by the packing companies
would go to the farmer.

Free trade in grains was another point
brought out by the speaker, who proved
that beyond a doubt by his striking
illustrations that the capitalist was
again interested and determined to fight
against anything that would help the
farmers.

In concluding his remarks Mr. Guthrie
stated that the Liberal party need have
no fear as to the outcome of the election,
as the farmers and wage-earners from
east to west are united in favor of reci-
procity. The people have waited forty
years for free trade, and they are
going to have it at last.

The convention was then concluded
with three cheers for the King, Sir Wil-
liam Laurier and Mr. Fred Pardee.

sent to the United States, but Mr. Fisher
said that if the \$4 duty were
removed, the most of the hay sent to
Great Britain would go to the United
States, bringing better returns to the
farmers of Canada. Over \$250,000 worth
of potatoes went to the United States, as
compared with \$200 to Great Britain. The
same was true of other farm products.

The Best Market.
"This does away with the claim that
the British market is the better market
for the Canadian," said Mr. Fisher. "In-
stead of the free market attracting the
farm produce of Canada, the market of
the United States took the large bulk of
it. The figures prove conclusively, I
think, that the American market is the
best for us."

"Great Britain trades where trade is
profitable," he continued. "In her open
markets, no question is asked where the
article comes from, so long as it is
cheaper and better. There is no senti-
ment in business. We give them a pre-
ference, and it is a good thing, but Can-
adian produce must be as good as the
best, and cheap, or it will not be pur-
chased. In spite of the fact that we are
an integral part of the Empire, it would
be well to do the same."

Mr. Fisher dealt with the preference
and Conservative tactics in the cam-
paign, and criticized their arguments in
the meeting closed with cheers for the
leaders of the party and the speakers.

Won \$5,000 For "Beating" His Way
