

SASKATCHEWAN TO CLOSE ALL BARS DURING THE WAR

Wholesale Trade To Be Taken Over By the Government and Operated Through Dispensaries—Vote Needed To Reopen Retail Business Places.

[Canadian Press.] Regina, Sask., March 18.—Saskatchewan will be the first province in Canada to completely abolish the bar. On July 1 next, not only will the retail sale of all intoxicating liquors come to an end, but the wholesale trade will be taken over by the Government and operated as a Government monopoly, under a system of dispensaries. Later even these dispensaries may be abolished, if a referendum vote the people of the province so decide.

This, in brief, is the effect of an announcement made by Premier Scott in addressing a meeting at 6 o'clock this afternoon, in company with J. J. Turf, at the Premier's residence. Scott announced the policy which his Government was prepared to stand or fall, in the following words:

Government Proposals.
The Government's proposals, submitted to the Legislature, are in brief and concrete form, are the following:

1. To close all bars, and to prohibit the sale of liquor in the evening, beginning April 1.

2. To convene the Legislature in the month of May and submit to the House a measure, of which the outstanding features will be the abolition of all bar and club licenses from July 1, 1915, until the ending of the war, and the taking over by the Government of the wholesale liquor business throughout the province immediately.

Referendum to Resume.
3. To provide in the measure that following the ending of the war the bar and club licenses shall not be revived, as the result of a referendum on the question, to be taken at the time of municipal elections held after peace is declared, but not earlier than November, 1915, a majority vote to decide, and the provincial franchise to be extended to the referendum, the Government to provide, most carefully framed safeguards against any irregularities, such as personation, false declarations, and the use of liquor or other improper influences; and for the more secure discomfitement of improper practices, appoint a procurator, to follow and prosecute infractions.

GERMANS RUSHING SHRAPNEL SHOWER TROOPS WESTWARD GREETED ZEPPELIN

Russians Convinced They Are Weakening Eastern Lines To Face British. Artillery At Calais Gives a German Air Raider Hot Reception.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 18.—A special to the Times from Petrograd says the Russian military authorities are convinced that some of the 22 German army corps moved in the eastern war theatre already have gone to Belgium or France, presumably to reinforce troops facing the British.

The dispatch says that the Germans probably are sending reinforcements to the Belgian theatre, where "the Russian have gained a complete mastery of the situation. The Russian move to show that owing to these German attacks, a serious German offensive in East Prussia must be abandoned."

DENIES INVASION OF EAST PRUSSIA. Berlin Statement Gives Location of German Lines in East.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 18.—Scott's Berlin correspondent sends the following: "An official dispatch declares untrue the rumors that there has been a fresh Russian occupation of parts of East Prussia. The German lines in the eastern war theatre run as follows: 'From the Pillau River along the banks and Bzura rivers to the Vistula.'"

"North of the Vistula, from the east of Plock across Zarnow and Stupsk, with situated south of the Vistula, in an eastern direction across the district north of Prasnaya, south of Myslenko, south of Kozna and north of Lomza, to the Bzura River near Mocarze, and then along the Bzura to the northwest of Opatow, which place is now being bombarded by the Germans."

"From here the line continues across the district east of Augustow to Kruszwica, Mielnik, Pleszewsk and Szani, and along the frontier across Tauragon to the northwest. From beginning to end the line is on hostile territory."

"The official dispatch then admits that to the north corner of the Province of East Prussia, north of Mielnik, small Russian forces invaded March 17. It adds that all measures have been taken to drive away these bands, which can only be called incursions."

HARWICH FARMHOUSE BURNS. Blast, March 18.—One of the oldest large frame farmhouses in Harwich situated near the Creek Road in the 14th concession, owned and occupied by Albert Lamb, was burned Tuesday. It is thought it started from sparks from the chimney.

NEW ZEALAND DEFEATS NATIONAL PROHIBITION. Wellington, N. Z., March 18.—National prohibition was defeated in the voting on the liquor question last December, according to complete returns, which have been announced by the Government. Supporters of local no-license also lost their fight. The vote

on both questions, which was close, follows: For national prohibition, 247,217; for continuance, 257,442. For local no-license, 229,474; for continuance, 274,495.

Since 1911, the percentage of no-license votes has fallen from nearly 50 to 45%.

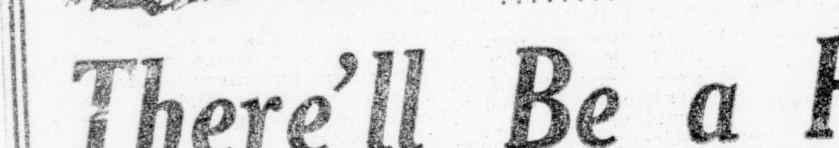

BOGUS LIEUTENANT IS SENT TO PRISON

PORT ARTHUR, March 18.—N. E. Finlay, a bogus lieutenant, with at least five aliases, and wanted in Quebec, Ottawa, Toronto, London, Hamil-

ton, Sudbury and Fort William, pleaded guilty in Port Arthur on a charge of passing worthless checks, and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

The London authorities have not decided as yet whether they will bring Finlay, who, under the name of Gillespie, passed checks here, back to this city to stand trial when his sentence is finished at Port Arthur. Finlay passed bad checks here to the extent of about \$300.

ITALIANS SENTENCED FOR SELLING SECRETS

Professor and Sergeant to Serve Long Terms in Prison. [Canadian Press.] Rome, via Paris, March 18.—Professor Menozzi, who was convicted in November of selling to a French agent secret plans for the mobilization of the Italian

army, has been sentenced to a term of seven years and six months in prison and a fine of 10,000 francs (\$2,000). Cavalry Sergeant Parigoli, who was found guilty of obtaining the information sold by Menozzi, was sentenced to six years and eight months and a fine of 7,000 francs (\$1,400).

Menozzi's complicity in the sale of military secrets was discovered after he had been arrested on a charge of smuggling saccharin.
