French Report Shows Progress in Lorraine and at Other Points.

PARIS. June 14 .- While it has been intimated for some weeks that the enemy would soon attempt a strong offensive in Flanders, it has not materialized. Yet reports indicate that there are important movements of German troops along the Dutch frontier, and the heralded attack is constantly looked for.

In sections where the Allies have been most aggressive the enemy has kept up a steady bombardment for days and nights. Under this violent firing, he yesterday succeeded in capturing of the trenches north of the sugar refinery of Souchez, which the French troops had occupied.

To offset this, however, the Allies have made gains. Strong Belgian attacks have driven back the German line near Westende in the region of Nieu-port, Mannekensviere and Schoore, the Belgians throwing a battalion to the east bank of the Yser and organizing also destroyed a German blockhouse.



"It is certain that Austria has left in territory actually occupied by us emissaries who have been given orders BE CALLED CONTRABAND emissaries who have been given orders to practice brigandage.
