

MACKENZIE KING TO ADDRESS MEETING AT ST. JOHN TODAY

ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 15.—Hon. William L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, arrived in this city from Charlottetown tonight, and will address a public meeting tomorrow evening. Mr. King, Mr. Lapointe, Premier Foster and others were guests at dinner of Mrs. Hon. Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Pugsley at Rothery's tonight.

MAKE UP LOSSES OF MEN WHO SERVED IN IMPERIAL ARMY

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—It was announced here today that the Dominion Government has taken upon itself to see that Canadians who have served in the imperial forces, naval, R. A. F., etc., shall suffer no loss through depreciation of sterling. Members of these services can now get through the banks the difference due to exchange on all checks, money orders, etc., representing pay, allowances, gratuity and pensions. It is also announced that forms are now available to these men of the imperial services to bring their gratuity up to the amount which would be payable had their service been in the C. E. F. These forms can be obtained from the paymaster-general, Canadian Building, Ottawa. In some instances this will mean as much as \$350 to the men.

BERLIN CLAIMS RIOTS AMONG FRENCH TROOPS

LONDON, Jan. 15.—A wireless dispatch from Berlin says that riots and mutinies have broken out among the French naval forces and troops at Toulon, the military and naval port of France on the Mediterranean. The uprisings were caused by insufficient bread supplies, the message asserted.

CLARKE EXPLAINS SPEECH REGARDING GOVERNMENT HOUSE

Replies To Drury's Letter, Says Reports Inaccurate.

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—Premier E. C. Drury, and Lieutenant-Governor Lionel H. Clarke have exchanged letters with reference to the lieutenant-governor's speech before the Rotary Club here a few days ago, when the governor was reported as having said it would be a calamity for Toronto and the province of Ontario if Government House and the position of lieutenant-governor were abolished. The premier's letter is dated January 14, and the governor's reply is dated today.

His honor states that he had no intention of giving expression to his personal views on a matter in active public controversy, and he suggests that comments on his speech have given an erroneous impression as to what he said. The premier's letter is in a friendly tone, but he wants to know what Hon. Mr. Clarke did say, as reports of his speech admit of several interpretations.

Following is the premier's letter: "In view of newspaper reports of your recent speech before the Rotary Club in regard to Government House, I think it desirable to ascertain from you if these reports are correct, and do this because they admit of several interpretations, but which tend to destroy that appearance of unity which in the interests of stable government, should be maintained between the representative of his majesty and his constitutional advisers. "I trust you will appreciate the spirit in which I write, and that a way may be found to remove any misapprehensions that may have arisen in the public mind in this connection."

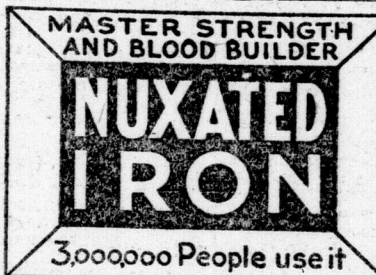
EXTEND MORATORIUM IN SASKATCHEWAN

REGINA, Sask., Jan. 15.—A bill giving the Government power to extend moratorium provisions in this province for another six months or for one year after the termination of the war was given its second reading in the Legislature yesterday.

Expend Sixty Millions Upon Ontario Roads

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—Sixty million dollars will be spent upon good roads construction in the province of Ontario during the next five years, according to Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works and highways, who returned to Toronto from Ottawa this morning.

Mr. Biggs succeeded in securing six millions of the Dominion Government \$25,000,000 fund for Ontario. The amount to be expended on main roads within the next five years is fifteen millions, said Mr. Biggs, six millions of which will come from the Dominion, six millions from the province and three millions from the municipalities. In addition to that amount 45 millions will be expended by the municipalities, which will be added in various ways by the Drury Government. The scheme will be developed to bear as lightly as possible on the taxpayers, he stated. On provincial highways it is understood the provincial Government will pay 45 per cent, the federal government 40 per cent, and the municipalities 15 per cent. An important feature of Mr. Biggs' announcement is that in the future the provincial government will pay 20 per cent of the cost of township roads.

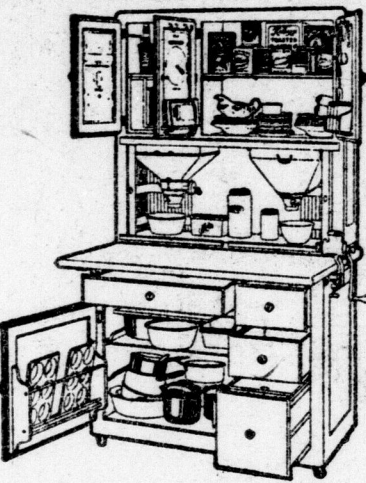
