### REFUSE PROPOSED **WAGE REDUCTIONS**

Workers Ended At Noon Today.

### INCREASES GRANTED

Based On Arbitration Board's Report.

Quebec, June 29.—The strike of the municipal firemen and policemen here ended at noon.

Mayor Samson, announcing the end of the strike, stated that the men had agreed to return to duty on the conditions submitted to them by the city, and which were based on the report of a board of arbitration which recently inquired into the demands of the men for increases in pay. inquired into the demands of the men for increases in pay.

The men will get increases of 75 cents and \$1 a week, according to length of service. The wage scale of the firemen and police now runs from \$18 to \$26 per week.

### MORE SABOTAGE IN QUEBEC STRIKE IS REPORTED

Quebec, June 29.—Further cases of sabotage in connection with the police and firemen's strike have been discovered here. While testing harness in one of the stations, volunteer firemen replacing the strikers discovered that it had been cut with a knife. ## ANGLO-JAP TREATY MAY BE REFERRED TO THE DOMINIONS

Quebec Strike of Municipal Lord President of Council Declares Alliance Treaty Must Be Brought Into Line With Requirements of the League of Nations-Meighen's Speech Occupied Whole Morning Session.

London, June 29 .- Debate upon the renewal of the Anglo-Terms of New Agreement Are Japanese alliance, in which the attitude of the various overseas dominions of Great Britain will be thoroughly explained, began when the imperial conference, in session here, opened this morning. Arthur Meighen, the Canadian premier, was expected to open the debate, laying the views of Canada before the conference.

### MORE ATTEMPTS TO STOP BIG FIGHT

Appeal to Supreme Court At Trenton Is Likely.

Jersey City, N. J., June 29.—Another skirmish, possibly two of them, was expected today between the International Reform Bureau and Promoter Tex Rickard to determine whether Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier were to be allowed to wallop one another here Saturday.

Three Jersey courts declined yesterday to stop the contest, which Rickard calls a boxing bout, and the reformers term a prize fight. So counsel for the bureau announced that they would appear before Prosecutor Garvan and ask him to tell the grand Jury that Rickard Dempsey, Carpentier et al, were planning criminally to fracture the state boxing law, and that they should be indicted as conspirators. The grand jury, however, is not scheduled to meet before Friday.

Meanwhile other bureau representatives were expected to appeal to the supreme court in Trenton to stop the combat, by an injunction or any other legal paper that would serve the purbose.
