ROY MITCHELL GIVES INTERESTING ADDRESS

Roy Mitchell of New York, formerly of Toronto, and director of the Hart House Theatre, who is at present on a transcontinental tour for the Canadian section of the Theosophical Society, spoke Friday afternoon at the Institute of Musical Art. "The future is in the hands of the amateur rather than in those of the professional," stated Mr. Mitchell. "And we should do all in our power to encourage the community theatre." AUNT MARIA RETURNS.

Dear Miss Grey,—Owing to a cancellation of trains on the G. T. R., our Advertiser does not reach us until it is a day old, so it was just this forenoon I saw in Saturday's paper a call for my attention. I have been so interested in reading letters from other Boxites I did not think it was so long since I wrote to the Mail-Box. But I have really been a pretty busy person doing sewing for not only myself, but for another household where the mistress of the house is even busier than myself. Besides this, I have pieced five quilts for other busy people, one quilt having over 3,000 pieces in it. I make up I am at present piecing another quilt and have material for a seventh one in the house, with a request for the making of an eighth one when the time comes. I am also making a serge dress for a busy mother. As to the request for a snapshot of the Mail-Box quilt, there is no one in this locality who has a camera except my son, who has a small kodak (Brownie). He said it would not take a big enough picture to be of use, so nothing was done in the matter. We are pretty far away from any place where we could get a good picture taken. However, my son will take a small snap, and if it is any good I'll send it along as soon as we can get it developed. I have been much interested in the accounts of the gardens of the Boxites. My poor flowers are now suffering somewhat from the dry weather, and water is not very near by, so I am hoping for rain. My house plants have done finely, though, except the pelargoniums, which have developed plenty of foliage but very little bloom. Gloxinias have been grand. Six have bloomed, and all are different. I have one more yet to bloom. By the way, I just learned this summer that the inner or white rind of the orange can be used in making jelly from fruits that do not jelly well. I made delicious raspberry jelly, using 4 cups juice, 3 cups sugar, white rind of one orange, boiled fast for 15 minutes or less. The rind can be peeled off and dried when one is using oranges, and is then on hand when wanted to make jelly. My letter is getting too long and my pen is not very good, so will close with best wishes for our autumn.

So you have come back to us, Aunt Maria. I was sure you hadn't forgotten us, but might have known you would be busy. Your garden must be a perfect picture. We will have to nickname you "Mary, quite contrary." You must be very kind-hearted to help your neighbors, making quilts and dresses and other clothing. I think if the snap were a good one we could have it enlarged satisfactorily. Thank you for passing on the tip for making jelly; it would be well worth trying, I think.
