Agar of Mississauga plays Mrs. Gordon Ferrie of Hamilton, in the semi-finals of the championship flight in the Ontario ladies' golf tournament. The matches will be played tomorrow afternoon at Weston.

In today's play the two strongest favorites for the title, Mrs. Gordon Ferrie, the 1924 champion, and Miss Mackenzie, last year's defeated finalist, were carried to the eighteenth hole before they managed to eliminate their opponents, both of whom represented the Toronto golf club. Miss Mackenzie defeated Mrs. Strathearn Hav 2 up, and Mrs. Ferrie advanced to the semi-final round by virtue of a one-hole victory over Mrs. W. A. Whittington. Both of these matches were all square at the sixteenth, and both the winners won the seventeenth, going to the last hole in the lead, Miss Mackenzie increasing her lead by winning the last hole, and Mrs. Ferrie maintaining her advantage by halving the home hole.

In the other two second-round matches the more experienced players were successful. Mrs. Hume Wrong of the Toronto golf club winning from her club-mate, Miss Margaret Laird, 4 and 2, while Mrs. T. J. Agar, Mississauga, defeated Mrs. J. A. Goodearle of Weston 3 and 2.


