ENEMY SHIPS ARRIVE IN NEW YORK

Fine Grim Reminder of War Have Anchored in the Hudson.

Five grim reminders of the war, ships of the former German Imperial Navy allotted to the United States, were towed to anchorage in the Hudson River late yesterday afternoon. Four of them, a cruiser and three destroyers, had been so badly damaged that they had been unable to cross the Atlantic under their own steam and were towed by army transport Hancock.

By the terms of the peace treaty all of these ships must be destroyed within one year of the date of their arrival here. Hundreds of naval engineers and officers are to examine the dreadnaught, the cruiser and the destroyers. The Ostrifland, Frankfort, V-43 and O-102 were at the Battle of Jutland, in 1916. The three destroyers were among the vessels sunk at Scapa Flow by their own German crews.

The Frankfort reported the presence of Beatty's fleet at Jutland and sank two British destroyers. Water in the engines at Scapa Flow permanently ruined this craft.

After landing the Frankfort, still in good condition, was almost constantly at sea, a menace to British fishermen and the ships sailing between New York and Liverpool. She probably caused more worry to the Allies than any other single ship of combined Central Powers.

A HOLIDAY RAMBLE.

Mr. R. H. Montgomery, President of the Montgomery Co. Limited is an interesting gentleman to meet. His eighty years he carries lightly and his quick and active mind is still normal. His account of the early settlers of New Richmond is most interesting. It sounds like a novel. But truth is stranger than fiction. These early pioneers passed through many hardships. In summer they lived on corn and fruit and in winter on rabbits and caribou. And when neither could be obtained buckled their belt a little tighter until food was obtained.

The land was divided off into concessions and the farms are in tiers one after another, stretching for many miles from the sea coast. The present population is almost evenly divided between Catholics and Protestants. The first Protestant church was built at Black Cape, the members being mostly Scotch. The Presbyterian Church at New Richmond is about 80 years old. The present pastor, Rev. Mr. McKay, has a delightful home by the side of his church and is very popular.

Among the many attractive stores in the place is that of Starrak & Co. Mr. Starrak lately passed to his reward. He is spoken of as a good man with splendid ability, honorable and upright in all his dealings. Mr. John Call a capable and energetic man has charge of the business and is a popular merchant.

Perhaps the most historic spot in New Richmond is the bank of the Hudson. This is a beautiful point of land—Stanley Point, which thrusts itself out into Bay Chaleur, by Lord Stanley. This for many years was a resting place for a number of Governor Generals of Canada. Here Lord Stanley, Minto, Aberdeen and others spent some happy weeks in summer fishing, swimming and shooting. There our noble King George V spent part of a summer when he was Prince of Wales and ordered himself to the place by his many gracious acts.

The place is now owned by Mr. Lanctot of Montreal who spends his summers here. Mr. Lanctot is a very genial gentleman to meet and his home in my next letter I want to speak of a love-making scene witnessed en route and of a wonderful discovery which has been made.

City Is Beautiful Even in Ruin

The decadence of the two continents, present political and economic disintegration, wars without end, and an uncertain future, have been unable to destroy the ineffable charm the Turks originally gave to Adrianople, a city of eighty odd thousand souls. Adrianople is still a holy city in faith and in appearance. Romance still abides there.

"The Orient is the only place left to Europe where cities seen at wide range are beautiful," remarked Jules Sebelin, a French aviator, while visiting the most beautiful of all mosques, Sina's masterpiece in Adrianople, the mosque of a thousand windows but one, erected at the order of Sultan Selim II. in the sixteenth century.

The first impression of the city had been one of infinite beauty. Arriving from across the lofty Balkans with airplanes, the city had been seen with a rush, a place of spruce and slate domes and red roofs, planned at the intersection of three rivers. It had been a welcomed sight within the end of a four hours' ride, and it was scarcely a day's ride to a tired aviator.

Soon from the city, surrounded by poplars at its outer rim, its home gardens within the city streets, or vast the forests, the outlying fields bare, aroused memories of Marlin, on the mountainside, by the Thracian and hosts of other Turkish cities, always gleaming in beauty, whether visited by sunshine or moonlight.

The longer the stay in Adrianople, the more the charm of this beauty grows, a charm that is as great as that of a aloft.

Adrianople is a city that has the tone of country friendship about it, not unlike a county seat of the south. The center of the agricultural exchange business between Eastern and Western Thrace, it is frequented by peasants and "traders" of Persian, Greek, Bulgarian, Jewish and Armenian nationalities. There is no record of but one American ever doing business in the city, and he came from Paris and bought up all the land.

While no day knows what the next may bring forth in the way of political strife, to-day the city preserves this tone of friendship and order. Strangers as they go along the streets, or visit the forests, are treated with kindly concern. The Turkish officers salute courteously and the natives greet the stranger with a friendly smile.
