HON. JOHN MORRISY ACCUSES J. Fabien Bugeaud PREMIER AND COLLEAGUES

(Continued from Page Two)
city band here, a note which was referred to when Colonel P. A. Guthrie, M. P. P., spoke in the house this session, a note which was renewed from time to time, apparently, and one of the payments made upon it, \$500, was furnished by the secretary or deputy minister of the agricultural department, the minister of which had full knowledge of the transaction?

Time to Speak Plainly.
"I speak plainly, Mr. Premier, for the time has gone by to deal with these matters in any other way.

"I know of other transactions that will detract greatly from the efforts you are making in 'insisting on the maintenance of high character in the public service.' I have another reference to make because of the statement in which you state 'You have displayed a disposition in many matters to act alone rather than in conjunction and harmony with the other members of the government.' The latter part of that statement is, in a measure, and only in a measure, correct. When I felt that my department was not being used in the interests of the public, a feeling that became a certainty with me during last summer and fall, I did feel a certain reluctance in joining with my colleagues in pursuing such a course. That reluctance became intensified early during this session, when I saw that a deliberate attempt was being made on the part of members of the government to give false information to the people in answer to opposition inquiries.

"I am old-fashioned enough to believe that the rights of the people are above everything, that we are only stewards of the public, and when I became sure from personal experience in swears, which were made up by my officials from the records there, were being changed and falsified by my colleagues in the council chamber and returned to my department to be rewritten and given to the public in the house of assembly, I determined to put a stop to it, if possible.

"For this purpose, and with this end in view, Mr. Premier, I went to the highest authority in the province, His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor Wood. I was one of his advisers, the same as you, and I told His Honor what was taking place. I informed him that false information was being given to the people and that the time had come when I felt that I could not stand for it, and would have to resign from the government.

"He told me then that he was very much surprised at the information I gave him, and desired me to remain as one of his ministers for a while longer. It was in deference to that request, Mr. Premier, that I remained in your government.

"But I may recall to you another circumstance which occurred on the very same day that I saw his honor the governor. You will remember coming into my room in the hotel shortly after luncheon and asking me to answer an opposition inquiry concerning the extra paid to Contractors McVey & Sons upon the suspension bridge, St. John. You will also remember, Mr. Premier, that I stated to you you could take that question to those who had been lying to you. You left me then in anger, because I refused to do that which I felt would prove me false to my trust, to the people who had elected me, and who regarded me as looking after their interests.

"That question was answered and you well know how it was answered; but the explanation of how and why that \$19,200 was paid, instead of the amount allowed by the engineer, \$63,66, has yet to be given to the public.

"Working out of harmony with you? How often have I been consulted in matters of importance during this last year? Did you or your colleagues when you were settling the important affairs of the Valley railway consult with John Morrisy? Did your acting premier, and Mr. Baxter, and Dr. Landry, notify John Morrisy that they were changing the route of the Valley railway? No. You know that you did not. You and they are the men who have ignored the principles of constitutional government. You have flouted your colleague whom you have threatened from time to time, and did not dare to dismiss because you felt that you would insult a particular class and the particular friends whom he was supposed to represent in the house and in your government.

"I regret exceedingly that I have felt it necessary, in justice to myself, to write the leader of the government of which I have been a member for eight years, such a letter, but, as you truly observe, your communication to me agrees with my personal inclinations, and I beg therefore to notify you that, in compliance with your request, I have placed my resignation in the hands of His honor, the Lieutenant-governor.

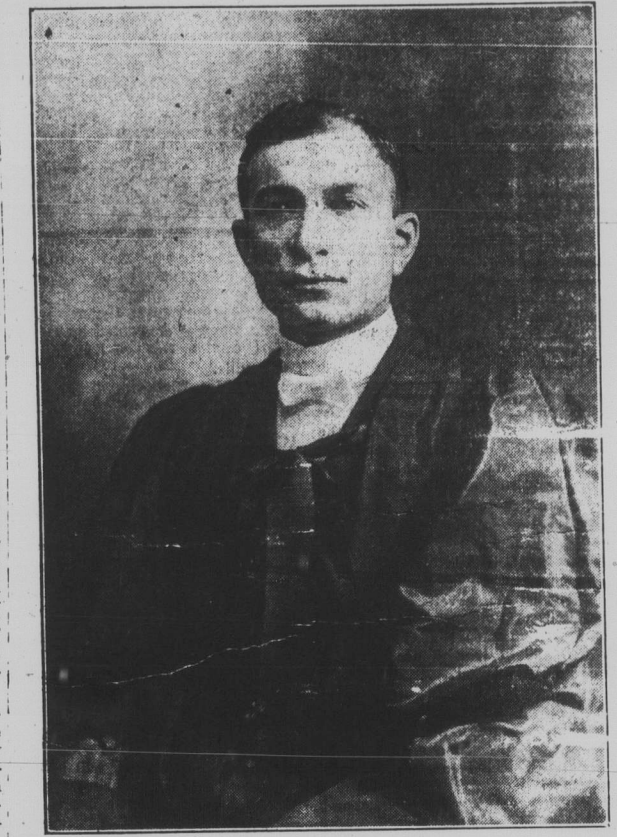
Pleasant Pastime—"I am afraid, madam," said a man who was in search of apartments, "that your house is too near the station to be quiet."

THE SHELL COMMITTEE INVESTIGATION

At the Shell Committee investigation at Ottawa on Friday, Mr. T. B. Caldwell one of the favored American munition manufacturers gave evidence to show that on one of the contracts handed over to his company a round million of dollars was so easily secured over and above legitimate profits that it was divided up among the leading spirits, Bassick, Yoakum and Caldwell, the price being \$4.00 for the same fuse that the company sold direct to England for \$2.67.

Of this Yoakum got about \$500,000 for his "trouble" in negotiating the contract and he gave Col. Allison \$197,000, G. W. Stephens of Montreal \$10,000 and Col. McBain \$30,000. Yoakum admitted there was a signed agreement among the three for the distribution of profits just as Mr. Kite charged in the Dominion house. Col. Hughes who denied there was any such agreement may have been in ignorance of it entirely, but the way in which the Shell Committee turned down capable Canadian manufacturers and threw millions to the Americans makes disgusting reading for citizens of this country.

Col. Allison it may be remembered was the gentleman who claimed that he was saving millions for the British Empire and was doing this good work for purely patriotic motives. The need of the investigation has now been thoroughly proved and whatever comes out it is hoped that a lesson has been taught that will be heeded in all future contracts.

DOMINION DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

There is Money in it.

Today the prudent farmer hardly dreams of planting seed grain without testing it. He realizes there is on deposit in the Bank of Nature a huge sum of money, much of which may be his if elementary rules are followed in seeding and cultivating.

The average dairyman with twenty cows may reasonably expect as his share of nature's hoard a yearly income of two thousand dollars if the resultant crops are marketed through suitable cows. But can the unselected, untested cow be expected to take a prominent part in that annual distribution of nature's wealth? She may be fed and cared for to the best of her owner's ability, but there seems to be a loose end if he does not turn round and test her, determine her ability to turn the vast deposits in nature's bank into a round nine thousand pounds of milk and leave a clear profit if milk fetches one-twenty per hundred.

Just guessing at good vitality and power to grow is queer work; guessing at a cow's production and profit is risky and unnecessary. It is very risky because many a dairyman is deceived without the use of scales and test, quite unnecessary because the dairy division at Ottawa supplies, free of charge, milk record forms. Write for them, either the three day per month or the daily kind, with a herd record book. Their use gives certainty. Test your cows, there is money in it. C. F. W.
