THE SCOURGE OF EUROPE.

THE OLD LANDS HAVE A HARD BATTLE WITH CHOLERA.

Army Surgeons of Opinion That the English Battle is a Harder One Than That of the Continent.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—It is a significant fact that the two deaths from cholera which have occurred at Glasgow as well as the three deaths at Ottawa, are the only deaths of local emigrants who were on their way to the United States.

While steamer passengers on board ships on which actual outbreaks of cholera have taken place have been detained by the English authorities, many shiploads coming from infected ports, including Hamburg, have been allowed to proceed.

The English medical authorities are making a grave error in believing the danger of cholera infection by communication is the opinion held by several army surgeons who were interviewed at this season of the year continental emigrants are swarming.

Supervision or any modified form of quarantine is a worse than useless precaution to take in these cases, as it kills to a fancied security and leaves the danger as "nothing short of an absolute prohibition of immigration to England and the United States will be a serious barrier to the progress of the disease."

Already the indirect outcome of the cholera cases in London and Glasgow is a fall of American travelers who have cut short their continental journeys, in many cases a day's notice, and who have arrived in order to take passage home.

Unfortunately the principal Atlantic liners are always on their return trip, and at this season of the year they find it impossible to make room for would-be voyagers.

Quarantine scores are obliged to wait over here until room can be found for them, while others are taking passage by less popular lines, or are waiting in the streets for fast passages in order to reach home at all hazards.

A suspicious case in London. LONDON, Aug. 30.—The first suspicious case of cholera in London is a Frenchman, who arrived from Hamburg on Saturday at the hospital, suffering with symptoms of Asiatic cholera.

Extensive measures have been taken by the East End hospitals to meet any demand in the event of an epidemic. The strictest rules have been formulated to keep both the patients and the attendants isolated.

The sanitary authorities have in no wise relaxed their vigilance. Every day the lodging houses are subjected to a rigid inspection.

Considerable uneasiness is felt here because of the knowledge that cholera is waiting to break out in London, and in one of the worst places in which it could appear. Notwithstanding the quarantine which has been established, the steamer from Hamburg are allowed to land and the result of this is shown by the fact that two new cases of cholera have been reported yesterday on the steamer Peregrine from Hamburg. They show that the disease can be brought to this country by the sea.

They proceeded to their homes, and to-day the disease appeared. The district is filled with small households, and the disease is spreading rapidly.

Hamburgers Treated Like Lepers. LONDON, Aug. 30.—The Berlin correspondent of The News says: The export cases of Asiatic cholera in this city did not create a panic. The sanitary authorities have decided to stop the gratuitous distribution of disinfectants in order to prevent their use, and to avoid an unnecessary feeling of safety. At the same time the largest forces of inspection will begin, and ample provisions for the maintenance of the interior has been ordered.

Prof. Koch has issued a warning against over-watering of the streets, the humidity claims to favor the spread of bacilli and the rapid consumption of water preventing effective filtration of the water.

The most conflicting reports as to the extent of the epidemic in Hamburg have been published. Hamburgers are treated like lepers and their faces, and it is impossible for them to obtain lodging. Many have been ordered to sleep on railroad trains at a few stations before reaching Berlin and to come into the city by local trains to avoid suspicion. The authorities are ordering departure at short notice and several lines of battle ships are keeping watch on the coast.

The attitude of the Government, so far as can be inferred from these and similar facts, is one of preparation for war. The English authorities are in a state of readiness to sustain the American course toward Hamburg.

The Government is said to be in possession of reliable information that the so-called Russian epidemic party in the Baltic is actually a conspiracy of several thousand men, and that it has forcibly occupied territory that is undoubtedly Afghan.

In Honor of Talmage. LONDON, Aug. 30.—The mayor of Plymouth today gave a jubilee luncheon in honor of Rev. Mr. T. D. Talmage of Brooklyn, N.Y., who is on a visit to the city. Many of the leading citizens of Plymouth and a number of clergymen were present.

French Successes in Dahomey. LONDON, Aug. 30.—A despatch received here to-day from Kolon says that the Dahomeyans have abandoned their entrenched camp situated eight miles to the westward of Takou and are now retreating into the interior.

Ten New Cases in Antwerp. ANTWERP, Aug. 30.—Ten persons suffering from cholera were admitted to the hospital to-day. One of the patients subsequently died.

One Death in Brussels. BRUSSELS, Aug. 30.—One death from a fatal case of Asiatic cholera occurred here to-day.

A Newspaper Seized. VIENNA, Aug. 30.—The police to-day seized The People's Voice for announcing that a train covered to the nearest limits with fugitives from Hamburg had passed the Bodensee station and entered Austria without having to undergo a medical inspection or quarantine.

Deaths at Atlanta. BERLIN, Aug. 30.—There is a slight abatement in the severity of the cholera at Atlanta. From Sunday to midnight Monday the record there shows 20 new cases and nine deaths.

NO BLOOD STAINS FOUND.

THE ANALYST GIVES EVIDENCE IN THE BORDEN CASE.

He Examined the Stomachs of the Murdered Persons and Found No Trace of Poison—He Also Examined the Axe That Could Not Be Blood Stained.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Aug. 30.—The court came in at 10.30 precisely, and the first witness called was Prof. Edward S. Wood, the man for whom everybody has been looking for days. He said he had received a package containing two stomachs on Aug. 4 and 5. All were properly labeled. The stomachs were labeled "Mr." and "Mrs. Borden." The stomachs appeared to be perfectly normal. Mr. Borden's stomach contained about 11 ounces of solid food, which was partly digested and contained starch and meat. The contents were chiefly meat, and there were no signs of poisoning. The stomach of the girl was also examined, and it was found to be normal.

The price of disinfectants, especially of carbolic acid, has risen 100 per cent. This has placed the purchase of disinfectants beyond the reach of the poor. The newspapers advocate the gratuitous distribution of disinfectants.

On the Canadian Frontier. WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 30.—Surgeon-General Wyman has appointed Dr. Mulhern a special inspector. Details to assist the inspectors in examining immigrants and baggage from Canada. The collector of customs at Ogdensburg, N.Y., has been ordered to detain all immigrants and baggage from Canada. The immigration stations on the north include Rouse's Point, New York; Morrisville, Ogdensburg, Washington, Fort Covington, Morris Junction, Buffalo, Charlotte and Niagara. The responsibility of the points of inspection will be stationed to assist the regular immigration inspectors.

Reported in Venezuela. PANAMA, Aug. 30.—It is reported here that Asiatic cholera exists in Venezuela.

Twenty Deaths a Day. LONDON, Aug. 30.—The Times of St. Petersburg correspondent says the average daily cholera record is 100 new cases and 20 deaths. It is the greatest mistake to say the epidemic is spreading in London. The authorities affirm the contrary. In some cases the victims succumb to two or three attacks. The responsibility of the New Orleans cases is the cholera mortality begins to show marked fluctuations, contrasting with the previous increase.

Four Cases at Liverpool. LIVERPOOL, Aug. 30.—Four Russian emigrants were said to sail from this port to-day for America were stricken with cholera. They were all once removed to a hospital.

Strick Inspection at New York. NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—The steamship Yucatan from Vera Cruz and Havana, which arrived this morning, was permitted to leave, quarantine being observed. The ship was inspected, and it was found that there was no sickness aboard her.

Attended Hamburg. HAMBURG, Aug. 30.—The official returns of the Imperial Board of Health of Berlin, which give a detailed account of the progress of cholera and deaths from the disease in this city as 447 and 173 respectively, are reported to-day. The returns include the names of the patients, the date of their admission to the hospital, and the date of their recovery. The total number of cases is 620, and the total number of deaths is 173.

Huntley and Davis were fatally shot. They were captured.
