There were present about 150 Irish-Americans. Thomas Addis Emmet presided over the meeting. Speeches of welcome were made by Hugh McCaffrey of Philadelphia and M. S. Holmes of Jersey City. A long address setting forth Mr. Blake's services in the cause of Home Rule was presented. The guest of the evening then made an address, in the course

of which he said: The difficulties in the path of the Home Rule advocate are now far less than in the past. Heretofore the fighters have fiad to face not only obloquy, shame and disgrace, but even death. Compared with the labors of those gone before us ours are easy. Our adversaries are constantly making assertions of difficulties in the way of Home Rule. Principal of these is the statement lately published that Mr. Gladetone is about to retire. My opinion about that is that nothing but inexorable necessity would ever make him give up the reins, and he will die in harness. I hope he will live to see the accomplishment of Home Rule, but if he does not our cause will not go down. His memory will strengthen and unite us when he is gone.
