SEALERS' CLAIMS EXCESSIVE

SENATOR MORGAN FIGURES THEM DOWN TO A FIN POINT.

The Damages, He States, Were Largely Speculative - U.S. Never Admitted Any Liability - Secretary Gresham's Offer \$182,000 Too Large - Morgan Only Willing to Pay \$95,100.

Washington, March 8. - The interrogatories addressed to Sir Edward Grey in the House of Commons on Thursday last relative to what the United States proposed doing in the matter of paying the Behring Sea sealers' claims and the answer made by the Under-Secretary of State, it is thought here, might have taken a widely different turn had the Senate permitted Mr. Morgan, chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, and one of the arbitrators on the part of the United States at the Paris tribunal, to have stated the account between the two governments as he had prepared it and as he sought to publish it in the record during the closing session of Congress.

Mr. Morgan asked to be permitted to print in The Record an account which, he said, showed that the claim for damages made by the British government and the carrying of sealing vessels in Behring Sea was greatly excessive, but objections were made.

Explaining his action, Mr. Morgan said today: "A very mistaken view of this matter was entertained by the agents of the two governments agreed upon a statement of facts which the tribunal of arbitration found to be true, and entered it on record.

Canada's Claim Never Admitted. That statement of facts included only the names of 20 sealing vessels. The tribunal had no authority to pass upon any questions touching the liability of the United States Government for having made such seizures. The United States has not a right to arbitrate any claim of or against Canada and has never admitted any liability to Great Britain connected with any such claim or demand. It was only agreed to arbitrate respecting such liability as the subject of such a claim or demand. Mr. Morgan then set out the names of the vessels and the claims made on their behalf which were included in the record, but which was shut out by Mr. Turpie's objection.

The Damages Speculative. The statement showed that the amount claimed by Great Britain with interest was \$542,169.28; that the amount claimed by Secretary Gresham was \$435,000. Mr. Morgan said the schedule of claims for the vessels was divided into three classes, namely: "probable catch," "balance of catch," "estimated balance of catch," etc. These were clearly prospective profits or speculative damages, and were all based on future or contingent events, forming no basis of fact on which a claim could be predicated. This had not been allowed.

Mr. Morgan estimated that the excess proposed to be allowed by Secretary Gresham was fully \$150,000. He added: "The above figures and comparisons are based entirely on the supposition that every vessel included in the schedule submitted by Sir Julian Pauncefote was owned by a British subject. It appears, however, that a large number of the vessels were in fact owned by citizens of the United States."

Figures the Sum Claimable at \$79,914. He figured up the general result as follows: Total amount claimed by Great Britain, \$542,169.28; total amount of claims of United States citizens presented to the tribunal, \$442,255.28; balance resulting in amount claimed by British owners, \$100,000.00. But of this amount claimed by British subjects speculative damages, \$70,000.00; leaving the amount claimed by British subjects, less speculative damages, \$30,000.00.

The total amount of claims of British subjects which, as Mr. Morgan contends, is possibly to be recovered, amounts in all to \$79,914. But even this sum, which is \$471,254 less than the British claim, is based on the fact that the amount of the State proposes to pay for "personal claims" and \$34,636 in "probable catch" claims are not included in the total. These claims are not citizens of the United States or some other country, which fact has been established by investigation.

Deducting the "personal claims" from \$79,914, there is left, as Mr. Morgan says, \$45,278. Of this sum \$150,000 appears as the claim of the Henrietta (less speculative damages). The Henrietta was seized in the Behring Sea last September, 1892, under the provisions of the modus vivendi, and therefore no claim is allowable. But even if allowed, it is not a "probable" character from the fact that there is claim for an "estimated catch" being made when sealing was not allowed there, and the season was over at the time of the seizure.

Writing to Pay \$95,100. Senator Morgan concludes that Great Britain claims the sum of \$432,169, and that the amount due, with interest, is \$492,102, making an excess of the claim over the amount due, with interest, of \$44,000. The Secretary of State proposes to allow \$425,000, which, according to Senator Morgan's figures, is \$28,897 in excess of the total amount due to British subjects, with the interest computed.

"When the Government of the United States," said Mr. Morgan, in conclusion, "has made no agreement, and no admission of any indebtedness to Great Britain on account of these claims, and has not admitted any principle on which the claim of Great Britain is based, I must insist that these matters should be discussed in negotiations with equal opportunity to both sides. I could not agree that speculative profits should be included in the accounts, unless that, in accordance with the laws of nations, such a precedent would soon develop into the most bitter and violent contentions between nations."

THE UNEARNED INCREMENT

Brought Up and Discussed in the British Commons.

London, March 8. - Andrew D. Provan, a Liberal representing a division of Glasgow, brought up in the Commons this evening the subject of the unearned increment. He moved that: "No improvement of land should be equitable unless it include the direct assessment of such an enhanced value of the land as is due to an increase of population, wealth and the like."

Mr. Shaw-Lefevre, President of the Local Government Board, replied that he would not doubt there had been a considerable increase in the value of urban land since the passing of the act of 1891. The landlords had enjoyed the full benefit of the increment without bearing the share of the increase of taxation. He could not commit himself to any particular scheme of reform, but he promised a Government bill, but he could express his hearty endorsement of Mr. Provan's views.

He is attending school in England, and has a choice of three professions to follow in order to complete his education, or of returning at once. It is not as yet known what his intentions are.

The train consisted of three Pullmans, first and second-class coaches, mail and express car, every one of which were derailed, the Pullmans and the first and second-class coaches being thrown on their sides. One of the coaches was occupied by the Roland Reed Company, the other having a full complement of passengers.
