

FIRST MEMORIAL SERVICE TO DEAD

British and United States Air-
men Honor Victims of
ZR-2

CEREMONY AT HOWDEN
Total of 22 Bodies Recovered
From the Wreckage

HOWDEN, England, August 31.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—In the ancient church of St. Peter's here, the first of a series of memorial services to be held in Yorkshire for the victims of the giant dirigible ZR-2, which was wrecked near Hull last week, was celebrated to-day.

Thirteen United States airmen and British attended the service, marching in from the airfield, a mile distant, where the ZR-2 was housed before its fatal flight one week ago to-day.

Air Vice-Marshal Vyvyan and several other high officers of the Royal Air Force and the British army were among the congregation.

A number of relatives of the British victims were present, one of whom was overcome by grief that she had to be taken out of the church by a boy scout.

The service was conducted by Rev. W. W. Rees, first chaplain of the Howden airfield.

THREE MORE BODIES.
HULL, England, August 31.—Three more bodies were recovered from the wreckage of the dirigible ZR-2 late to-day, making a total of 22 since the disaster.

One of the three was identified as that of Flying Officer V. H. Wicks. A body, which was washed ashore this morning, was later identified as that of Sgt. J. W. Mason, of the Royal Air Force.

OUT ON BAIL.
WOODSTOCK, August 31.—The local authorities to-day released Sydney MacBrien, of Toronto, from jail, where he had been held for the past three weeks on a charge of theft. MacBrien's brothers furnished \$5,000 bail demanded by the crown. The accused is alleged to have misused funds obtained through selling stock. He is wanted in Barrie and in several other places on charges of theft and obtaining money under false pretences.

Efficient Housekeeping

WHAT KITCHEN EQUIPMENT HAVE YOU?

It is a fact that only half the kitchens in this country are well equipped. Perhaps this is because the average bride goes to housekeeping with only a few tools of work, intending to "add to them later on"—and then does not add to them; other expenses of housekeeping come up, or perhaps she prefers to put any extra money into living-room improvements or other things not actually essential.

I don't believe many women realize how really necessary it is to have a perfectly equipped kitchen. When I go into such a place I always want to roll up my sleeves and go to work. But when I enter a poorly-equipped kitchen I have a discouraged feeling right away. And so do you, reader friend, though you may not realize it. When our work is made easier by having the proper tools we are naturally more cheerful and happy and ready to work.

Have you the following things in your kitchen? You should have.

Wires: Basket for deep-fat frying, broiler, dish drainer, potato masher, pourer sieve, sink strainer, soap shaker, toaster, tea strainer, wire egg basket.

Miscellaneous: Jelly bag, pastry bag, with tubes, coffee mill, large needles, skewers, pail, scales, meat grinder, aluminum cleaning pan, fireless cooker, electric coffee percolator, silver-cream pan, garbage can, potato ricer, vegetable brush, asbestos stove sheets, fancy teapot.

Nickel: 2 forks, 2 tablespoons, 4 teaspoons, 1 half-teaspoon.

Agateware: Double boiler, colander, funnel, a one-quart, a two-quart, a four-quart, a six-quart and an eight-quart saucepan, each with cover, a skimmer, a large basting spoon, a pancake turner, egg slicer (for fancy salads or for spinach garnish).

Glass: Two deep pie plates, 2 shallow pie plates, 1 large casserole, 1 smaller casserole, individual casseroles (or "ramekins"), butter crock with cover, fruit jars and jelly glasses (as many as needed), lemon squeezer, 2 measuring cups (one for liquid measuring and one for dry, when mixing a cake), spice jars and other containers.

Earthenware: Two large mixing bowls, 2 small mixing bowls. White enamelware: Dish pan (oval), pitcher, dipper, platter, large round "milk pan."

Japaned wear: Bread box, circular cake box, flour canister, sugar canister, tray.

Tin: Angel cake pan, apple corer, strawberry burner, bliscuit, doughnut, and cookie cutters, 4 bread pans, 4 and shallow cake pans, flour after quart measure, pint measure, grater, 2 six-well muffin tins, steamer that fits any kettle, wheel egg beater.

Steel: Broad knife, can opener, cork screw, ice pick, meat knife, potato paring knife, nut cracker, spatula, double-runner chopping knife.

NEW PALESTINE AIR ROUTE.
JERUSALEM, Sept. 5.—A new air route has been opened up across the desert between Palestine and Mesopotamia, and notification has been received of the arrival at Baghdad of three airplanes of the Royal Air Force, which have flown over this route. These machines formed a reconnaissance party that set out from Palestine with the object of establishing a more direct line of connection between the existing aerodromes at Ramleh, in Palestine, and Baghdad, in Mesopotamia. The length of the new route is about 500 miles, which is considerably shorter than the more northerly route formerly used. The line followed, which is an extension of the present Cairo-Ramleh route, starts from Ramleh, which is the main Royal Air Force aerodrome in Palestine, passes through Amman, in Transjordan, and Kaskazak, where landing grounds have been prepared, and proceeds thence in an almost straight line to Ramad, on the Euphrates, and on to Baghdad.

LET'S BUY SOME TOYS.

Yesterday afternoon I saw a man out in his backyard with a kite.

I don't suppose he would have expressed it that way. He would have said he was teaching his 5-year-old youngster how to fly a kite. But then he couldn't see his own face and he could not know that he looked just as excited, just as ecstatic as that youngster—if not more so.

An eminent nerve physician said the other day that it would be a fine thing if grown-ups would buy more toys for themselves and play with them. And a merchant commenting on this declared that they were doing it. They made, he said, a series of the wonderful mechanical and building toys for his boy and takes quite as much interest in them as the child is. The man, he said, and every year more men who have grown acquainted with these toys by buying them for nephews and cousins, and other relatives and friends, are frankly buying for themselves.

The old jest about the father, or the uncle, or the grandfather, who is so punctilious in his painful duty of taking the children to the circus has a root deep in human nature. In the majority of grown-ups the love of toys and simple play has never wholly died, but they have thought it their duty to bury it alive. Give it half a chance and it will come to life again.

Some years ago I had bought at the 5 and 10-cent store for Christmas uses some wonderful little mechanical cars that ran just so far, reversed themselves against a bumper and ran back. The author, who was home one night on sick leave, discovered them and we spent the evening combing tracks, and running our cars in competition and in other similar ways playing with those ridiculous, delightful toys. It was one of the happiest, most peaceful and relaxed evenings ever spent and I would not exchange the memory of it for many a finer entertainment.

Do you remember the passage where Stevenson imagines himself as a child, saying when people laugh at him for sticking to his toys, "Plainly I must give up my belongings since I am not in a position to secure myself against idle jeers. At the same time I am sure that playthings are the very pick of life, all people give them out of the same pusillanimous regard for those who are

a little older, and if they do not return to them as soon as they can it is only because they grow stupid and forget. I shall be wiser." And in the end he was for the story runs that he never ceased to enjoy playing with his wonderful collection of lead soldiers.

Is there not some toy that you have never had enough of when you were a child or that perchance you coveted and never possessed at all? (I am not talking to the parents who have young children, they will get their happiness by giving to their children. I mean those who are not so blessed.) If so, is there any reason, except lack of courage, that you should not buy it for yourself to-day?

I think perhaps I shall lead the way by buying myself a kite. Watch out and perhaps you will see me flying it some fine windy day.

NOT A PARTY TO MINISTER'S ACT

Indian Government Issues Statement on Conspiracy Charge

CASES WERE WITHDRAWN

Minister of Industries Accepts Full Responsibility

LONDON, August 31.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Extraordinary interest has been aroused in India by what has become known as the "Calcutta munitions case" and the startling developments therefrom.

In this case four persons, including Sukhlal Karnani, managing director of the Industrial Bank, which financed a number of Indian industrial concerns, with consequences of the "Calcutta case" and the startling developments therefrom.

The case was dealt with by Sir Thomas Holland, member of the Indian council, in charge of the department of industries. Sir Thomas, after investigation, decided to withdraw these cases from prosecution, one of the reasons given being that harm might be done to Indian industrial development if the prosecution succeeded. Two ministerial colleagues, whom Holland consulted, agreed to withdrawal of the charges, though not on wholly identical grounds.

The Government of India has now issued an official communique, stating that the withdrawal cannot be treated as the considered decision of the governor-general-in-council, who desires to make it clear that it is impossible to justify the withdrawal on the specific grounds given in the case.

Sir Thomas Holland has admitted that he committed an error in judgment in failing to submit the matter to the governor-general-in-council. He has unreservedly accepted full responsibility in the matter and has tendered his resignation.

MARK TERCENTENARY OF FOUNDING OF N. S.

Lord Birkenhead and Chief Justice Taft Among Those to Send Congratulations.

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S., August 31.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—The sun shone down between the purple hills of Annapolis this afternoon on old Fort Anne, where the first court of British common law in Canada sat 200 years ago, where Thomas Chandler Haliburton ("Sam Slick"), Nova Scotia's son of letters and law, often wandered after he settled in this town in 1821; a fort of some importance when three centuries back Sir William Alexander received the charter of New Scotland from the hands of King James I.

To-day several hundred persons of the Canadian twelfth century stood in the parade ground to listen to the story of past works and to remember those three events. The simple act of unveiling the bronze tablets, presented by Premier Murray, on behalf of the province, commemorating the granting of Nova Scotia's charter, presented by Chief Justice E. B. Harris and Sir James Atkins on behalf of the bench and the bar of Canada, remarking the establishment of that instrument of justice, the court of common law, and presented by F. C. Whitman, vice-president of the Historical Society of Annapolis Royal to perpetuate the memory of the arrival there of the well-known "Sam Slick," impressed the gathering of moderns beyond belief.

Justice William Chisholm read letters of congratulations from Lord Birkenhead, lord chancellor of Great Britain, and Chief Justice William Howard Taft, of the United States.

Hon. F. B. McCurdy, minister of public works, was present to receive the tablets on behalf of the Federal Government.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES' WAGES CUT

Official Ending of War Means Saving to Treasury of £500,000 Weekly.

LONDON, August 31.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The official end of the war to-night brings a cut in wages and salaries of employees of the Government approximately £500,000 weekly. Civil servants' bonuses, based on the cost of living, have been reduced considerably. The higher grades of workers lose 10 to 40 per cent. of their recent pay. Salaries under £100 yearly are reduced from 5 to 25 shillings weekly, and agricultural wages fall six shillings weekly. The Defense of the Realm Act, embodying a variety of war-time restrictions, lapses to-night. Its provisions have long been virtually inoperative. Extended licensing hours, which came into effect to-morrow, were heralded to-day in the great brewing town of Burton by bands, singing and other outbursts of rejoicing.

VARIED TEMPERATURES RECORDED IN AUGUST

Highest 92 on the 30 and Lowest 45 on the 23rd; Rainfall 2.53 inches.

Mostly varied temperatures marked the month of August this year as it did for the same month of 1921.

During the month just closed the highest temperature registered at the official observatory here was 92, on Tuesday of this week, while the lowest was 45 on the 23rd, exactly one week earlier. In 1920 the highest was 91 on the 7th, and the lowest 42 on the 23rd.

The rainfall for the past month was 2.53 inches compared with 2.46 inches in August 1920.

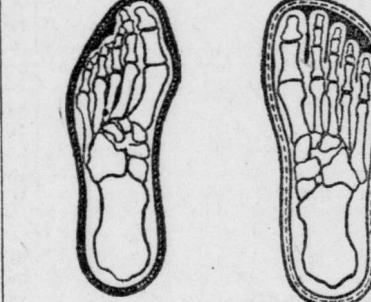
The Little Girl who stands on one foot
