PROTEST REDUCED TRAIN SERVICES

Brantford Merchants Send Telegram to C.N.R. Head ORGANIZE TO OPPOSE CUTS Only One Train Each Way On Goderich-Buffalo Line BRANTFORD, Dec. 30.—(Associated Press Dispatch)—A telegram was sent to the C. N. R. head office today protesting against the reduction of train service by the C. N. R. which now have but one train each way per day on the Goderich-Buffalo and Brantford-Tillsonburg lines. Haldimand, Brant, Oxford, Perth and other counties affected have indicated through their federal members and others that they will back up Brantford's protest against elimination of local trains without other service being substituted. The telegram, which was sent to Sir Henry Thornton, pointing out the serious loss of trade involved and asking if something could not be done in the way of Diesel cars or substitute service. This afternoon they and members of the Board of Trade filed a protest with a representative of the C. N. R. traffic department sent to Brantford following receipt of this city's first objection. It is pointed out that all mails for the district affected will now be 24 hours later and local bakers have been informed that contracts for bread from them will be cancelled as the bread would arrive 24 hours later than previously. Robert Everson, M.P., who has filed a protest with Ottawa, has received word from members of the surrounding counties that they will back up Brantford. The essential electric car service between Brantford and Guelph is working out quite satisfactorily and cheaply. It is held here that such service should be given on the two lines on which trains but one each way daily have been cancelled.

WANTS CORRESPONDENCE IN LAMBTON OIL PROBE

Mr. Armstrong's motion reads as follows: "For a copy of all papers, letters, telegrams, documents, memoranda, correspondence, reports, and references to an investigation into the oil industry at Petrolia, Ont., and Oil Springs, Ont., made by Mr. Russell, of the finance department, in the year 1924."

ASK INFORMATION FOR EMIGRANTS

British Press Hold They Should Understand Problems DOUBT EMPLOYMENT HERE Criticism For Scheme To Bring Settlers To Canada LONDON, Dec. 30.—(Associated Press Cable)—The Daily News deplores the fact that so little information is supplied to potential British emigrants to other parts of the empire with regard to the problems they will have to face. The Daily News, cites as a case in point the new agreement between the British and Canadian governments by which the new rate for migrants to the Dominion is £3 to Halifax, St. John, N. B., or Quebec, and higher according to the distance they go westward, and asks what guarantee the Canadian Government can give that permanent employment will be found for those who risk everything by going with their wives and families to the Dominion. "These comments serve as a preface to the development of the familiar argument against encouraging the departure from the United Kingdom of the very men who are most commonly to be found in our own country." The News adds, "and it is submitted that the average Englishman is not adaptable to the conditions in the Dominion nor to its climate hardships."

COAL COMPANIES IN BIG MERGER

Canadian Concerns Affected By Bituminous Industry Deal PRODUCING AND SELLING Corporation With Capacity For 15,000,000 Tons Annually NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—(Associated Press Dispatch)—Formation of the North American Coal Corporation for the purpose of combining the Pittsburg Terminal Corporation, the Cleveland and Western Coal and other large properties, some of which are in Canada, was reported under way here today. Frank E. Tapin, president of the Pittsburg and West Virginia Railway and Coal Company, is expected to head the new company which will have a producing and selling capacity of 15,000,000 tons annually and represent the first important merger in the bituminous industry in many years. Other coal properties which may be drawn into the combine include those of the Powhatan Mining Company, Standard Coal and Coke Company and Island Creek Coal Company, in addition to dock properties of the Inland Coal and Dock Company, Duluth; United Coke and Dock Company, Milwaukee; Canada Coal Company, Limited, with docks at Sault Ste. Marie and Little Current, and Michipicoten Coal Company, Ontario.

CANADA'S IMPORTS AND EXPORTS INCREASE

Figures For the Eleven Months of Year Ending November 30 OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—The sum of Canada's trade for the eleven months ending November 30, 1925, was \$1,903,780,686. In the whole 12 months of 1924 the total trade was valued at \$1,856,255,471. Figures for December, 1925, are not available, but the current month shows as high a trade as last year the increase in 1925 over 1924 will be around \$22,000,000. The total imports in the 11 months of record, are valued at \$1,343,000,000. Exports totaled \$1,090,421,626. In the corresponding period of 1924 imports reached \$1,249,835, and exports \$925,628,426, making a total trade for that period of \$1,856,255,471. The total duty collected on Canadian goods imported in 1925 was \$118,009,661. For the same period in 1924 it was less than \$115,000,000.

TERRIFIC GALES SWEEP ENGLAND

Western Europe Generally In The Storm District SERIOUS FOR MARINERS Transatlantic Steamships Experience Heavy Seas LONDON, Dec. 30.—(Associated Press Cable)—Gales and torrential rain, with a delay in the departure of the waters of the channel and parts of the Atlantic, and sweeping over England and Western Europe. Steamships crossing the Bay of Biscay report the worst conditions in 30 years. Transatlantic liners are encountering exceptionally high winds and heavy seas. One captain wireless "We are passing through an awful mess, but all is well." London is also storm swept, and weather experts estimate that 11,000,000 tons of water fall in the metropolitan area within a single hour.

WOULD END RAILWAY SERVICE COMPETITION

Existence of C. N. R. - C. P. R. Committee Is Confirmed MONTREAL, Dec. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—In the absence of Sir Henry Thornton, officers of the C. N. R. today confirmed a statement issued by R. Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, that the traffic and operating officers of the C. N. R. and C. P. R. had formed a committee to deal jointly and in a fair and broad way with all questions of competing services. "The committee," he pointed out, "has been in existence for some time and meetings have been held in which train service matters have been discussed. But the contractions which caused the release of 18,189 persons by the 5,860 reporting firms were the smallest since the beginning of the war. The number of persons employed by these firms on December 1 was 753,302; the index stood at 95.3, as compared with 97.1 in the preceding month and with 98.8, 96.7, 95.1 and 87.2 on December 1, 1924, 1923, 1922 and 1921, respectively."

BRITISH DEBATING TEAM WILL ARRIVE JANUARY 10

MONTREAL, Dec. 30.—The imperial debating team, which is representing the British dominions in the universities, debating societies and clubs, will arrive in Canada on January 10, it is announced at McGill University. The team consists of four members, representing the older and newer universities of Great Britain, and is made up of a debating one, a logician, a representative of Oxford University, T. P. Macdonald, University of Edinburgh; Paul Reed, University of London, and R. Gunn May, Birmingham University. The subjects of debate number three and are as follows: The Geneva protocol; the question of the maintenance of naval bases at Singapore, and "That western civilization is becoming a degenerating influence on mankind." On February 11, the team will proceed to London, where they will meet University of Western Ontario, the subject to be the question of whether the influence of western civilization is a degenerating one. On the following day they will visit Niagara Falls, where the team will be the guests of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission until February 15, when they will depart for Niagara Falls and the electrical developments.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The Peking correspondent of The Daily Mail reports that Marshal Chang Tso Lin is retreating from the north, threatening the line of communications of Gen. Feng Yu-Hsiang, who is rushing up reinforcements. The forces of Gen. PIONEER PUBLISHER DIES IN 96TH YEAR Robert A. Graham Printed First Newspaper in Wingham. WINGHAM, Dec. 30.—With the passing of Robert A. Graham on December 29, in his 96th year, Wingham lost one of its pioneer citizens. The deceased in the 60's taught school in the Village of Wroxeter for a number of years, moving to this district where he and his family settled eventually in the town plot of Turnberry as a farmer. A number of years afterward he entered the publishing business, printing the first newspaper in Wingham, bringing the first printing press here in 1872, when he began publication of the Wingham Times, which he sold to the Advance Company two years ago. He was highly respected by all who knew him and a member of St. Andrew's Church. His wife predeceased him seven years ago. He leaves a family of four boys and three girls, James Malcolm, Thomas, Frank, Elizabeth, Mary, Beatrice. Funeral services will be held at his late residence on Friday with interment at Wingham Cemetery. 35-MILL TAX RATE FOR HAMILTON PREDICTED HAMILTON, Dec. 30.—Hamilton's hope for retention of the 32 1/2-mill tax rate for the coming year received a severe blow to-day, when Chief Collector Hopper announced that tax returns were \$300,000 below the estimate. This sum is the approximate equivalent of two mills. In addition to this, the street railway company owes over \$60,000 to the city in mileage, and it is unlikely that in 1926 there will be any revenue to collect from this source. Numerous other expenditures must be paid for in the coming year. Forecasts of the tax rate are as high as 35 mills. SIGHTS THE CORONADO Dutch Steamer Says Nothing Seems Wrong With Boat LONDON, Dec. 30.—A wireless message to Lloyd's, received by way of Valencia, Ireland, and signed by the captain of the Dutch steamer Corijnssen, says: "Passed Elder and Fyffe steamer Coronado at 11 o'clock this morning (local time) 48.9 north latitude, 10.87 west longitude, steering 253 degrees. She did not answer our wireless call. Nothing seemed wrong with her." Elders and Fyffe, Limited, owners of the Coronado, doubt whether Tuesday night's S. O. S. came from the ship. They think the calls were picked up by some foreign vessel which mistook either the meaning or the name of the ship. OVER \$7,000,000 IN ALLOWANCES TORONTO, Dec. 30.—More than \$7,000,000 have been distributed by the Ontario Mothers' Allowances Commission since the coming into force of the act in 1920. Fifty per cent is chargeable to the municipalities except in Northern districts. This year \$1,700,674 was paid out in allowances.

TOOK POISONOUS TABLET IN ERROR

Chatham Woman Swallowed Bichloride of Mercury IN CRITICAL CONDITION Box Similar To That Containing Tablets For Heart CHATHAM, Dec. 30.—Mrs. Jephtha Peers is in a critical condition in St. Joseph's Hospital here as the result of taking a bichloride of mercury tablet in mistake for a heart pill. Mrs. Peers had been taking treatment for heart trouble for several months and thought she was taking the usual medicine when she swallowed the mercury tablet, one of which was contained in a box that had been placed near a similar container to that of the other medicine. It was not until she became ill several hours afterward that the mistake was discovered. Her physician, Dr. W. A. Egle, stated that the mercury tablet, while her condition is favorable it will be several days before the crisis will be reached. BROTHERS CHARGED Ivan Clark, a local young man, and his younger brother, who are alleged to have participated in a free-for-all fight a few nights ago, appeared in the city police and juvenile courts this morning on charges of disorderly conduct. The cases were enlarged for a week. YOUNG MEN ERNEST Roy Gallipio and Ernest Smith, the young men who were apprehended following the unfortunate shooting accident in a barn near Louisville a week ago, when Alfred Hutwisk, a young boy, was shot in the knee, were released from custody to-day. The boys were shooting pigeons and when it came to Gallipio's turn Hutwisk was stationed at a window to keep the birds from escaping. The officers are convinced that the shooting was entirely accidental and that Gallipio's story, "that he had no idea of how it happened," is true.

TWO MINERS PERISH 2,000 FEET UNDERGROUND

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 30.—Trapped 2,000 feet below the ground by a cave-in in the Pacific Coast Coal Company's mine at Black Diamond, W. R. Bruner, 36, and Emil Piquet, 35, were buried alive yesterday. Bruner's body, crushed to death, was recovered by mine rescue crews last night after eight hours' work. Workers are trying to reach Piquet, but it was believed he was dead. Six other men working on the same level when the cave-in occurred escaped without injury. HIGNET IS RELEASED. MONTREAL, Dec. 30.—Irvin R. Hignet, "national lecturer" of the Canadian Ku Klux Klan, who recently pleaded guilty to evading a local hotel bill, which he did. Questioned by the judge as to his future movements, the "human dynamo," as he is described on a card found in his possession, said that he would leave for Toronto to-night. REV A. A. CAMERON DEAD. OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—Rev. Dr. Archibald A. Cameron, aged 84, prominent in Baptist activities in Canada and the United States, died here to-day. Besides having charge of the pastorates of Ottawa, Winnipeg, Denver and Brooklyn, N. Y., he was for three years superintendent of the Rocky Mountain Synod and was for four years chairman of law enforcement in Brooklyn, N. Y.
