Toronto Markets.

Toronto, March 21.—Receipts to-day at the City Cattle Market were 50 loads, with 775 head of cattle, 464 sheep and lambs, 400 hogs and 326 calves.

The run was light and the trade for choice butcher cattle was correspondingly active. There is, in fact, a scarcity of choice butcher, and anything in the way of real fancy light heifers is eagerly sought after. A few in this class picked out to-day, weighing in the neighborhood of 1,000 pounds, sold at \$6, or about 10c. higher than the best for export cattle in yesterday's market. Choice butcher all round were from 5c. to 10c. higher. The advance does not apply to common rough mixed butcher and fat cows. These are decidedly draggy and off anywhere from 50c. to 60c. from a couple of weeks ago. Extra choice fat cows, however, are still quoted at \$5 to \$5.30, but these are few.

Quotations to-day are: Extra choice fancy butcher heifers, \$5.90 to \$6; choice steers, butcher or export, \$5.85 to \$6; medium choice, \$5.50 to \$5.70; cows, \$4 to \$5; bulls, 4.00 to 4.50; common mixed butcher steers, cows and bulls, \$3.50 to \$4; canners, \$2 to \$2.50.

Calves steady at \$4 to \$5.50.

Sheep steady at \$4.50 to \$5.

Lambs, light, run at \$6.50 to \$7; heavy lambs, market dull and easier.

Hogs—Market steady at this week's decline of 10c. to \$6.65 f.o.b., and \$6.95, fed and watered.
