

SCHOOL EXHIBITIONS

THREE SUCCESSFUL ONES HELD IN ANNAPOLIS COUNTY LAST WEEK.

Teachers' Institute at Lawrencetown and Exhibition—A Good Exhibit at Bridgetown, and Another at Round Hill—All Well Attended.

Last week was one of particular interest to educationists and farmers in this vicinity.

The Teachers' Institute for that part of Annapolis County east of Annapolis Royal, met at Lawrencetown, Bridgetown and Round Hill, on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and was well attended by a class of teachers that would be difficult to surpass in any part of the province.

Wednesday afternoon ten schools at Lawrencetown, Paradise, West Paradise, Central Clarence, Clarence, North and South Williamstown, Brickton, West Brooklyne, West Ingleville and East Ingleville, united in an exhibition at Lawrencetown which would have been a credit to the most experienced farmers of the Annapolis Valley instead of school children. The domestic science floral, art, needle work, etc., was all of a high order, and the whole affair proved a great credit to teachers and pupils.

In the evening a public meeting of citizens and visitors filled the auditorium room of the Demonstration Building. The chair was occupied by Mr. T. G. Bishop, President of the Board of Management, who was certainly the right man in the right place. Another hustler in connection with this exhibition was Dr. J. B. Hall, chairman of the arrangement of exhibits, but all connected with the whole affair to serve a large amount of credit for its success.

The speakers of the evening were Dr. W. McKay, Supt. of Education for Nova Scotia; Rev. J. A. Hart, a former pastor of the Lawrencetown Methodist Church; O. S. Dunham, editor of the MONITOR; A. D. Brown, Bridgetown's popular postmaster; School Inspector M. C. Foster; Dr. M. E. Armstrong, chairman of the Bridgetown School Board; R. E. Thurber, Principal of the Bridgetown Academy; Prof. Geo. E. Sanders, of Annapolis Royal; Rev. H. Beals, pastor of the Lawrencetown Baptist Church; and Rev. S. J. Roy, pastor of the Methodist Church.

Feature of the evening's program was an essay by Miss Lena B. Foster, Lawrencetown, entitled "How Me the Common School Exert a Large Influence on Rural Life." The meeting closed with the National Anthem, the visitors being loud in their praise of the hospitality extended them by the citizens of Lawrencetown, one of its most enterprising places in the Annapolis Valley.

BRIDGETOWN'S SHOW

Friday was exhibition day in Bridgetown, the following schools taking part: Bridgetown, Clarence West, Centerville, Hampton, Belleisle, Tupperville, Carlton's Corner, Beaconsfield, Chesley Section, Gesner Section. This display was tastefully arranged in three rooms in the school building, as follows: Flowers and Vegetables; Manual Training Work; Domestic Science; Needle Work, Drawing, etc. The whole exhibition was certainly a good one throughout, and teachers and scholars had a right to feel pleased with the result of their effort.

A public meeting was held in the evening, the attending teachers and the seating capacity available in the school room occupied. Dr. M. E. Armstrong, president of the management committee, presided in his usual genial manner.

The speakers were Inspector Robinson, of Kings and Queens Counties, who spoke on "Rural Science and its Relation to School Work." Postmaster A. I. Brown, Inspector M. C. Foster, Rev. C. J. Jost, Principal R. E. Thurber and Prof. G. E. Sanders.

EXHIBITION AT ROUND HILL

Saturday was school exhibition day at Round Hill. This was also a big success. A well arranged program of entertainment took place during the afternoon, a pleasing feature of which was the presentation of a flag to the school by the ladies of the Red Cross Society of that village. A large number were present from Annapolis Royal, Bridgetown and surrounding villages.
