

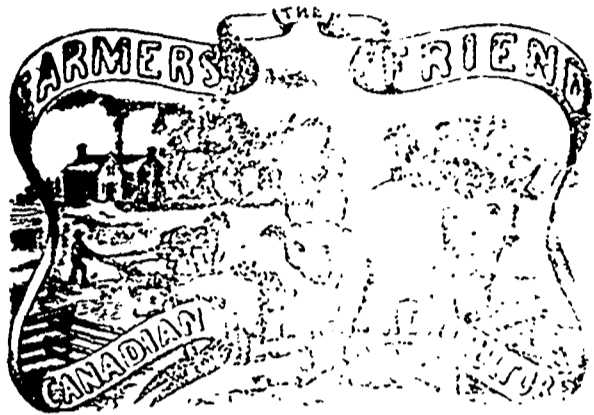
HEIGHT OF THE LAKE

EFFECT OF FEEDING CUT AND UN-cut HAY TO MILCH COWS.—From a communication made to the Agricultural Society of Worcester County, Massachusetts, by Mr. William S. Lincoln, we make the following extract.

before commencing this experiment, I was feeding my stock—what would be called poor stock—with hay, with an allowance of root. I commenced cutting this hay for all my stock young and old (sixteen head) occupying one hour and a half daily.

FOOD FOR SHEEP—A late writer of great intelligence on this subject says: "No farmer can feed cattle or sheep profitably without either turneps, mangel-wurtzel, carrots or parsnips.

CHURNING.—Butter should always be churned in a room or apartment the temperature of which is between thirty and sixty degrees.

TO STOP BEES FROM FIGHTING.—Breaking the comb of the robbers is said to be sufficient, by giving them plenty of business in taking care of their wasting honey at home.
