saying British Columbia has not done a good deal in connection with its highways, because they have some very beautiful ones—almost as good as those we have in Alberta. I cannot blame the government of British Columbia for what that man said. I realize it takes time to build highways, and that the funds in the hands of provincial governments are limited.

But I do say this, that since last year the government made the pronouncement that they were going to do something in respect of an all-Canada highway; and since they went into the election campaign proclaiming to the four winds of the earth that they were going to do something about that highway, we want to see it done—and we do not mean during the next election. We mean right now. There is no reason why we should have to route our traffic through another country, thus missing some of the best tourist attractions to be found anywhere in the world. When I say that, I am referring to the beautiful scenery.

There are many subjects clamouring in my mind concerning which I might go on until

after midnight. However, rather than take a half hour to develop another subject I shall be pleased to give the floor to my hon. friend.

**BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE**

**Mr. St. Laurent:** It is intended tomorrow to proceed with the second reading of the bill in the name of the Minister of Justice to amend the Supreme Court Act and, when that is disposed of, to move that the house resolve itself into committee of supply to consider the estimates. If we get into committee we will ask to have five departments opened, so that on Tuesdays and Fridays we may consider the estimates of those departments. Hon. members realize that on Fridays we cannot start on a department which has not been introduced on another day of the week. If we get into supply we will ask to mention five departments, and to proceed with the estimates of the Department of Agriculture.
