IMPACT ON SOCIAL BENEFITS

Right Hon. John N. Turner (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Prime Minister. I want to quote from an election speech the Prime Minister made on October 15 to senior citizens in Summerside, P.E.I. The Prime Minister will know where Summerside is. That is the community in P.E.I. that he is trying to destroy by shutting down the Canadian Forces Base.

This is what the Prime Minister told those senior citizens: "As long as I am Prime Minister of Canada, social benefits, especially those for the elderly, will be improved, not diminished by our Government".

As long as he is Prime Minister of Canada. How does the Prime Minister reconcile those words to the people of Summerside with the cut-backs in social benefits, including old age pensions, family allowances, health, education, unemployment insurance, regional development? All of these were announced in the Budget. Is this not election fraud by the Prime Minister? Is it not just another reason why the Minister of Finance and this Budget ought to be thrown out?
