the Day for third reading at the next or some future sitting. If it is a Senate bill, the same procedure is followed, but there is no reference to the bill having been amended.

If the Senate adopts a report recommending that a bill be not further proceeded with, the bill shall not reappear on the Order Paper.

If a committee report is lengthy (e.g., a report on a special study by a select committee) the chairman, or a senator on his behalf, may ask, without moving a formal motion, that the report be printed as an appendix to the *Debates of the Senate* or to the *Minutes of the Proceedings of the Senate*, or to both, and the Senate can agree.

Where a report, by its terms, is for the information only of the Senate, it shall be laid on the Table and may, on motion, be placed on the Orders of the Day to be considered at the next or some future sitting.

A report from a committee may be referred back to it for further study. After the motion for adoption of the report has been moved, a senator may move, in amendment, that the report be not now adopted but that it be referred back to the committee for further consideration, or that it be referred back to the committee with instructions to strike out certain words or to amend it in any respect.

If a report on a bill contains one or more amendments, a senator may move, in amendment to the motion for the adoption of the report, that the report be referred back to the committee for further consideration or for the amendment of certain clauses of the bill.

The Senate may amend a report of a select committee, or may refer the report back to the committee, or to a Committee of the Whole, for that purpose. See Journals of the Senate, 1942-43, p. 84; 1946, p. 412; 1974-75-76, pp. 344 and 353.

When a report of the Committee on Standing Rules and Orders recommends changes in the Rules of the Senate, such report is usually referred to a Committee of the Whole for consideration.

A bill may be referred back to a committee at any time before its passage. A bill that has been reported from a joint committee may be referred to a committee of the Senate when it is before the Senate for consideration.
