

# 99½ C.P.R. Up Four Points--Mining Stocks Show Firmer Tone

## CONFIDENT TONE IN THE MINING MARKET

Fair Recovery Made Under Active Buying Demand—Even the Porcupines Showed Improvement.

The mining market yesterday clearly reflected the incoming of a more confident sentiment, a gradual movement toward higher prices by several of the Cobalts, evidencing the fact that a recovery from the recent setback was under way. Trading was not the same active plane as that which ruled the last few sessions, and an active buying demand was in effect throughout.

A good deal of interest is being taken in the improvement now being manifested in some of the issues in the five and ten cent class. During the present turn for the better various of these stocks which a month or so ago were not even quoted, have shown a disposition to wake up, and with the incoming of a demand have come in for what must be accepted as remarkable improvement. Little Nipissing, for instance, has been traded in this week for the first time since last September, with the price already at an appreciation of 150 per cent. over the quotation in that month. Union Pacific put in an appearance in the list of sales yesterday for the first time in a year. Mention might also be made of such securities as Green-Mechan, Gould, Silver Queen, Rochester and Silver Lake, all of which have been roused from their sound slumbers, and are now being accumulated by speculators who have faith in the future of these companies.

**Timiskaming Up Again.**  
The general list yesterday was inclined to better its position to some extent, but the movement, on the whole, was not overly significant, nevertheless the demand for stocks was of a sustained nature, and at the close prices were held practically at their top for the day. Crown Reserve sold as high as \$3.55, Peterson Lake as high as \$2.50, and Timiskaming moved up over a point under an active demand, and at the close was lower at the close, however.

Even the Porcupines showed a better trend, and higher prices for Hollinger and Pearl Lake attested the improved demand. The former was up 25 points at \$15.50, and closed at \$15.30 bid. Pearl gained a fraction at 23½, and evidenced a resilient tone throughout. Dome sold down below the \$12 mark on the curb.

## ARGENTINE CORN CROP A PARTIAL FAILURE

ARGENTINE—According to an official report the acreage sown to corn amounts to 3,850,000 acres, against 7,400,000 in 1911. The continued dry weather is causing a lower yield in many regions. Buenos Aires estimates the yield at 1,000,000 bushels, while the official opinion is that the late sown corn is practically lost, and the early sown is losing both quality and quantity.

**Winnipeg Grain Market.**  
WINNIPEG, Jan. 21.—The grain market was quiet in options and prices stronger on the fine continental and Liverpool cables. The opening was 1½¢ higher, and the market advanced a further ¼¢ to ½¢, which was not maintained.

Cash demand was fairly good. Export trade was inactive. The close was ½¢ higher for all contract grades.

Options in good demand, with firm prices, options closing ½¢ up. Flax was weaker and demand poor, with offerings heavy. Options were ¼¢ to ½¢ lower, but cash flax was ½¢ to ¾¢ lower.

## ADVANCE IN CORN MARKET FEATURE

Injury to Argentine Crop Through Heat and Drought a Stimulus to Prices.

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—Corn advanced a cent and led the grain markets upward today. Provisions declined 3½¢. Wheat opened higher because Liverpool failed to reflect the local weakness of yesterday. A decline ensued on fatness in the spot market, and then a recovery on reports of export business. Then there was another slump when it was stated that the latter traffic was in old Manitoba. In the end a report from New York that 40 loads had been sold abroad, and the pronounced strength of corn caused another upturn. The market had a hard close of the trading day came. Business was active in the last hour.

Among the considerations which influenced the pit were a report from Winnipeg that there was enough steady export business to check any radical decline, and a decline of eight points in the condition of wheat in France as compared with a year ago.

**Argentine Corn Damaged.**  
Corn was firm all day and closed at the top. Argentine news was the important factor. Corn at Buenos Aires is testing 49½ bushels an acre against an average yield of 85 bushels. Oats participated in the activity and strength, closing at the top. There was a better domestic call for cash oats, which were unchanged to 1-4¢ higher and an improvement in the future of these companies.

There was a slight let up in the demand which has kept provisions on the up grade recently, due to liberal hog receipts at primary points, although these were 24,000 head under the receipts of a year ago.
