Viennese Government Warns Servia and Greece That It Will Not Permit Bulgaria to Be Over-Humiliated-Roumanian Army May Prevent Any Attack on Sofia.

LONDON, July 25 .- (Can. Press)-The important developments today in the Balkan situation was a demand presented by the Austrian representatives at Athens and Belgrade for an immediate cessation of hostilities, together with a warning that Austria will not allow Bulgaria to be too greatly humiliated. It was declared in Vienna tonight that should Greece and Servia still oppose an armistice, a Roumanian army, acting as a mandatory of Austria and Russia, will prevent any attack on Sofia, and that Austria will take even more energetic steps, if necessary, to stop the war. Should it be true that Austria and Russia thus have agreed to co-operate, the pressure exercised doubtless will be

news is that the Servians have invested the ancient fortress at Vidin, Bulgaria, which is situated on the Danube, 130 miles south of Belgrade.

May Capitulate. The fall of the fortress cannot long be delayed; in fact, a Belgrade despatch reports that General Kutuntcheff's troops already are beginning to surrender. Vidin, which has a population of 15,000, will be Servia's biggest capture during the war.

No news was received today from the Turkish side, but it is reported that the Porte has ordered the mobilization of three army corps in Asia Minor.

A letter states that in one town 30,000 noncombatants were slaughtered. In order to secure the jewelry they wore ears and fingers were cut off and defenceless women and children were killed.
