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if the former were not set at Liberty in Consequence of a Request.

You then continue to quote "The Ambas"fador at Paris instead of demanding those
"Subjects of his Master, as Men unjustly held
"in Prison, and Reparation for the Wrongs
"they had received, was ordered by the Ministry to solicit as a Favour from the Court
"of France the Discharge of them, only
"acknowledging their Offence."

In Support of this latter Part only, you can quote the Letters from Lord Albemarle to Lord Holdernesse, and Part of a Memorial delivered to Mr. Rouillé.

Now, Sir, when I said that Lord Albemarle had never demanded these Men and their Effects, it could not be understood that I meant to say he had not asked to have them released; because the Men were released. All that could be meant then, was that these Men were not released in Consequence of a Demand, but of a Request. And if this appear to be true, tho' the strict Expression in Lord Albemarle's Letter puts it in the Light of a Demand; yet the Circumstances of the Case speak against it; and I have not violated the Truth.
