Con. Jones Talks Of Merry Lacrosse War in Dominion

VANCOUVER, B.C., Feb. 22.—There will be a merry lacrosse war in the Dominion this year according to Con. Jones, president of the Vancouver Lacrosse Club, who is on his way back from an extended trip to the United States, during which he had conferences with all the big men in the sport, including Columbia who is the avowed champion of the Dominion Lacrosse Union, according to Jones, manager of the Toronto St. Patrick's team, and manager of the Toronto Lacrosse Club, to put the British Columbia League by taking its place in the proposed national commission, which Mr. Jones suggested to the eastern managers, whereby the game could be controlled in all its angles, is just as far away as ever it was.
