GREECE TO CLAIM CONSTANTINOPLE

Hellenes Seek to Liberate Three Million of Their Race.

New York, Nov. 28.—Liberation of 3,000,000 Greeks held "under despotic rule" by Turkey and Bulgaria should be made one of the conditions of world peace, John N. Metaxa, former governor of Sardinia, and a personal friend of Premier Venizelos, declared in a statement issued through the Greek bureau of information.

GEN. LOGIE JUDGE; COL. GUNN SUCCEEDS

Former Will Shortly Assume Duties on Supreme Bench of Ontario.

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—It was announced by military headquarters tonight that Major-General W. A. Logie, who has, with the exception of a short interval, when he was overseas, commanded military district No. 2 (Toronto) since the beginning of 1915, would shortly assume his duties as a judge of the supreme court of Ontario. It was expected that an officer commanding one of the Canadian divisions in the field would be available to take over General Logie's duties at once, but cable advice are to the effect that the officer selected for this important district will not be available for a few months, as his services are required with his division at the front.

INDUSTRIALISTS TERRORIZED.

Berlin, Nov. 28.—Inquiry among the leading industrialists today drew out the admission that many of the largest plants in Berlin already are being systematically terrorized by the working forces. The latter are demanding exorbitant wage increases, shorter hours and other concessions calculated ultimately to force the employers to shut down.

TO LIMIT AMERICAN PEACE DELEGATION

President of U. S. Not to Sit at Conference Table.

CHIEF VICTORY OF AGES RENOUNCED BY FOCH

London, Nov. 28.—The war correspondent of the British wireless service at headquarters in France says that when the German delegates came to see Marshal Foch with regard to the armistice, the marshal, as well as the British high command, knew perfectly well that a few days more—the marshal put it at ten days at the most—would have seen the surrender of the entire German army into his hands and the culmination of the greatest victory of all ages.

MOONEY NOT TO HANG, BUT SERVE FOR LIFE

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 28.—The sentence of Thomas J. Mooney, sentenced to be hanged on Dec. 13 for the deaths of ten persons killed by a bomb explosion in San Francisco during a preparedness day parade, July 1916, was commuted by Governor W. D. Stephens tonight to life imprisonment.

BORDEN AT CANADIAN PEACE CONFERENCE

Canadian Associated Press Cable. London, Nov. 28.—Sir Robert Borden presided at a meeting of the Canadian peace conference. It discussed important suggestions connected with the preparing for the peace conference and the work of the Canadian trade mission.

WIRE FROM OTTAWA REQUESTS RELEASE OF BANKERS FROM ARMY

Bank managers and highly-trained bank clerks who are now serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force units in Toronto military district are to be given immediate release to return to civilian life. This announcement was received last night at Toronto headquarters in a wire from the government authorities at Ottawa.

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
