Richest Woman in World Chooses Young Diplomat for Husband.

Essen, Prussia, June 1.—The engagement is announced of Bertha Krupp, regarding the relations of David B. Hill, owner of the Krupp works, to Gustav Von Bohlen Und Halbach, secretary of Life Assurance Society, reports that the Prussian legation at the Vatican.




