WHEAT WAS RATHER STRONG

Liverpool Futures Moved up a Half Penny.

And Chicago Speculative Dealing Was at a Fractional Gain—World's Wheat Crop Statistics, as Published by the Washington Officials—Notes and Gossip.

Saturday Evening, Nov. 12.—To-day's wheat markets were somewhat strong and Liverpool futures advanced 1/2d per cent on a good demand. Ports wheat to-day advanced 1/2d to 10 centimes, four of the same thing.
Chicago futures were fairly strong in sympathy and on high wheat in the Northwest. The market closed 1/4c per bushel higher than yesterday.
Liverpool market closed unchanged to 1/4c higher for the day. Chicago corn held fractionally higher.
Peas declined 1/4d at Liverpool.
Total clearance to-day: wheat and flour equal to 655,000 bushels; corn 776,000 bushels.
Exports of wheat from America this week were 5,000,000 bushels, as against 6,774,000 bushels last week and 5,144,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.
Corn exports 2,144,000 bushels, as against 2,848,000 bushels last week and 2,846,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.
Primary wheat receipts 1,539,960 bushels, corn 684,445 bushels.
English farmers' deliveries of wheat the past week 77,700 quarters at an average price of 28s 4d.
Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 122,000 cwt, as against 123,000 cwt the corresponding day of last year.
Primary wheat receipts 1,539,960 bushels, corn 684,445 bushels.

The Crop of the World.

There are scarcely so favorable as they were commonly supposed to be when the estimates used in the table published a month ago were made. Australia has suffered severely from drought, but this is now broken, good rains having fallen throughout Victoria, South Australia and New South Wales. In the Argentine provinces wheat crop should fall short of the Broomhall estimate, the largest, it may in any case equal, or perhaps exceed, the very moderate estimates of the other two authorities announced last month. The Broomhall estimate was 54,000,000 and the Huntington estimate only 37,000,000 bushels, an increase of 17,000,000 bushels, while the estimate of the Broomhall was 37,000,000 Winchester bushels. Severe frosts have been reported from Argentina, but the latest accounts as to the outlook for the wheat crop in that country are not unfavorable.
An estimate, said to be the preliminary report of the Argentine Department has completed the official report of the crop of the world for this month, and a revised review of the world's wheat is an important feature. The Russian wheat crop is now put by the Minister of Agriculture at 41,000,000 Winchester bushels, an increase of 10,000,000 bushels from the official estimate. An estimate, believed to be below rather than above the actual yield, is credited to the Hungarian Agricultural Ministry, estimating the Hungarian wheat crop at 12,277,200 bushels of 60 pounds.
An estimate, said to be the preliminary official one, puts the German wheat crop at 8,000,000 bushels more than the 1907 crop, making it in round numbers 115,000,000 bushels of 60 pounds.
The official estimate of the Italian wheat crop puts it at 133,371,000 Winchester bushels.
The latest estimates of the Spanish wheat crop are a little less than 35,000,000 Winchester bushels.
The London Times estimates the wheat crop of the United Kingdom at 77,900,000 Winchester bushels, considerable in excess of the estimates a month ago. The official estimate for Roumania makes its wheat crop 58,452,004 Winchester bushels.
Official figures for Manitoba give its wheat crop at 26,720,808 Winchester bushels.
Preliminary official figures make the crop of Ontario 30,028,070 Winchester bushels, the lowest for the two provinces being 30,737,887 Winchester bushels. As the wheat area of the more northern provinces was much larger than in recent years, it seems that the total for Canada will reach the highest of last month's estimates, 63,000,000 Winchester bushels.
On the whole the changes from a month ago increase the total estimate of the world's wheat crop, but the conditions affecting the crop of the southern hemisphere

Live Stock in England.

The Montreal Trade Bulletin says: Things are not quite so bad in the meat trade as they have been called to be, though certainly prices are not at a high level and sales have in many cases been conducted on an unprofitable basis. The first part of the week was the worst in London, trade

picking up on Thursday on a turn in the weather towards lower temperatures. The quality of the animals showing is not of the best, as the Canada is concerned. Most weights of well finished beasts from the States have reached 36 to 40 stone, but Canadian could not reach 38, which is on account of the rough, unsharpened character of the big ranchers exhibited. Liverpool only 34 difference separated the two countries, but this makes a round sum on a beast. It cannot be helped, for demand runs only on the best beef. Canadian mutton has done better. On Monday 3s was the top quotation for the Canadian offering, but 3s 2d to 3s 4d was obtainable on Thursday with a better demand. In the provinces trade has not been so bad, and at Newcastle and Glasgow fair prices have been realized. At the latter 3s to 3s 2d per cwt. was reached by prime beef, sheep selling at from 25s to 30s for ewes and 30s to 35s for rams, young sheep for which there was a keen competition, reaching 5s 6d per head.

Flour—Straight rollers, in barrels, middle freights, are quoted at \$3.20 to \$3.25 at Toronto.
Wheat—Ontario red and white steady at 40c north and west.
Barley—Quoted at 47c north and west and 48c east.
Oats—White oats quoted at 26c to 27c, north and west.
Barley—Quoted at 50c, middle freights, for No. 1.
Buckwheat—Little moving, with 34c as a nominal quotation.
Rye—Sells at \$9 to \$9.50 west, and shorts at \$14 west.
Corn—American, 40 1/2c at Toronto, on track.
Peas—Are quoted at 30c north and west, in car lots.
Oatmeal—Car lots of rolled oats, in bags, on track in Toronto, \$3.40; in barrels, \$3.50.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of grain and other farm produce were very large, 82,000 bushels, and 30 tons of hay, which, together with fruit, vegetables, butter, eggs and poultry, made up one of the largest markets for some time.
Wheat farmer: 1100 bushels sold at following prices: white 74c to 74 1/2c, red 74c to 74 1/2c.
Barley farmer: 1000 bushels sold at 50c to 51c.
Oats farmer: 1000 bushels sold at 31 1/2c to 32c.
Peas are firm: 100 bushels sold at 67 1/2c.
Hay firm: 35 loads sold at \$8 to \$9.50 per ton, and one load at \$10 for timothy, and 10 loads at \$10.
Straw firm: 8 loads sold at \$8 to \$9 per ton.
Dressed hogs—Deliveries fair and prices firmer at \$5.40 to \$5.60 per cwt.
Dressed hogs—Choice to extra, 5c per bag, 10c per bushel.
Poultry—Plentiful: chickens 30c to 75c per pair, ducks 40c to 50c per pair, geese 40c to 50c per pair.
Butter—Choice to extra, 15c to 16c, with choice picked dairy at 20c to 21c.
Eggs—Strictly fresh, were scarce, selling at 23c to 30c per doz.; held over 20c to 22c.
The number of farmers who come in by train is steadily increasing.
Half of the wheat under the shed on the west side of the market was occupied with tables loaded with butter, eggs and poultry.
Mr. Wright, the market constable, had the tables well arranged, having got several hundred ounces made, of which more are needed.
