LOOTING OF THE DEAD  
Fort de France, Island of Martinique,  
May 13.—The United States  
government tug Potomac, which came

which made it necessary for her  
to go five miles out of her course.

2000 DEAD ON ST. VINCENT  
The United States government tug  
Potomac leaves for tonight for  
Vladivostok. The sea conditions  
are reported to be worse. La  
Soufriere, on St. Vincent, was in full  
eruption May 10. A storm of stones  
and mud half a mile wide was then  
issued from the volcano. Stones  
two inches in diameter fell 12 miles  
away. At Kingston, the capital of the  
island, the ashes were two inches deep.  
Seven hundred dead are reported  
from the island. The present vol-  
canic eruption on St. Vincent is the  
first since 1812.

## GOVERNMENT IS SHIRKING ITS JUST RESPONSIBILITY

WESTON HEARS MR. ST. JOHN  
Conservative Candidate in West York  
Greeted By Enthusiastic  
Admirers.

T. F. WALLACE AND DR. KAISER  
Reader Splendid Platform Support  
—How the License Inspec-  
tion is Worked.

Orchestral music, a rich display of  
flowers and plants, and a galaxy of  
the fair sex were features of promi-  
nence at an enthusiastic meeting held  
in the Weston Town Hall last evening  
in the interests of J. W. St. John, the  
popular Conservative candidate for  
West York. The hall was crowded to  
the doors, and the remarks of the vari-  
ous speakers were applauded to the  
echo.

James H. Taylor, president of the  
Weston Conservative Association, oc-  
cupied the chair, and among those on  
the platform were: J. W. St. John, Sam-  
uel Charters, Brampton; T. F. Wallace,  
Woodbridge; Dr. Kaiser, Oshawa;  
James Conroy, Reeve of Weston; W. J.  
Smithson, ex-president of the West  
York Association; W. A. Baird, Toronto  
Junction; Isaac Jovson, Richview;  
George Pearson, Weston; James Dun-  
can, Emery; John Gouding, St. Weston.  
The chairman, in opening the meet-  
ing, expressed his pleasure at seeing  
such a good attendance, and especially  
of ladies.

Corporation of the People?  
T. F. Wallace of Woodbridge was the  
first speaker called upon. He said the  
question before the province to-day was  
whether they wished to be governed by  
grabbing corporations or by the people.  
He certainly thought they would  
sooner be governed by themselves, and  
them to do the amount stated. The govern-  
ment admitted it was not a legal out-  
come of the election.

After Mr. Blair had defended the  
railway deal on the plea of urgency,  
W. F. Maclean asked if a member  
of the government or the government  
itself had given Messrs. Mackenzie  
& Mann power to go ahead with the  
construction of the railway before par-  
liament sanctioned the contract.

Mr. Sifton replied that no specific  
instructions were given to the  
contractors to proceed, but every mem-  
ber of the government knew the con-  
tractors were under the authority  
of the contract. Mr. Ross saw in  
the educational system a huge political  
machine, from which he could secure  
the greatest possible political advan-  
tage. It had been shown how he cre-
