cial freedom and entailing restraint upon national commerce. It is with the regulative power of the Congress, and that a wise and reasonable law would be necessary and proper exercise of Congressional authority, to the end that such evils should be eradicated.

I believe that monopolies, unjust discriminations, which prevent or cripple competition, fraudulent overcapitalization, and other evils in trust combinations and practices which injuriously affect interstate trade can be prevented by a law which should not only regulate interstate commerce with foreign nations and among the several states, but also regulate the operations of operating directly upon such concerns, the instrumentalities thereof and those engaged therein.

I earnestly recommend this subject to the consideration of the Congress with a view to the passage of a law reasonable in its provisions and just in its operations upon which the questions can be finally adjudicated that the regulation of interstate commerce is a constitutional amendment if it were impossible to accomplish the purposes above set forth by such a law, then, assuredly we should not shrink from amending the constitution so as to secure beyond peradventure the power sought.

Make Special Appropriation.

The Congress has not heretofore made any appropriation for the better enforcement of the anti-trust law as it now stands. Very much has been done by the Department of Justice in securing the enforcement of the law, but much more could be done if Congress would make a special appropriation for this purpose to the Department of Justice under the direction of the Attorney-General.

Tariff Reduction Not a Remedy.

One proposition advocated has been the reduction of the tariff as a means of reaching the evils of the trusts which fall within the minimum of the law, but this is a very ineffective, and this is a better way to insure its continuance to provide for a thorough efficient law. The refusal to maintain such a navy would invite trouble, and if trouble came it would insure disaster. Futious and unscrupulous, without scruple, slightness in refusing to prepare for danger is both foolish and wicked in such a nation as ours, and past experience has shown that such a policy in refusal to recognize or prepare for any crisis in advance is usually succeeded by a mad panic of hysterical fear, once the crisis has actually arrived.

Few subjects of more importance have been taken up by the Congress in recent years than the inauguration of the system of national and state regulation for the arid regions of the far West. A good beginning therein has been made, but this policy of national irrigation has been adopted, the protection will grow more rapidly, and the forest and scientific forest protection will grow more rapidly.

The President urges upon Congress the need of legislation for Alaska, and concludes with an allusion to the government's work in recent years in giving aid to the farming population of the United States.

The bill authorizes the Attorney-General or any District Attorney to make application to the Federal Judge for the summoning of persons before him to answer to a subpoena, and to make application to the Federal Judge in advance of the trial of a case, and requires the Judge to issue orders for the appearance of such persons upon this application. In such cases witnesses are to be protected against prosecution on account of their revelations, but they are to be deprived of the right to refuse to answer because of self-incrimination. Any reports are required to be made by all persons, firms or corporations engaging in interstate commerce, and are to be filed with the interstate commerce commission, and are to be subjected to the same public scrutiny as reports made to that of the general public. The Attorney-General is authorized to appoint fifty special agents to seek out violations of the law.

The Judiciary Committee of the house held its first meeting today and its first action was to set up an anti-trust measure before Congress at the earliest possible moment. All measures dealing with trusts and corporations referred to the sub-committee, of which Mr. Littlefield of Maine is chairman, and that sub-committee will go to work at once.

Senator Cullom introduced a bill to-day to amend the anti-trust law. It prohibits interstate commerce in articles produced by the trusts, the penalty for violations being a fine of \$500 to \$5000.

not the creature of law, but undoubtedly the laws under which we work have been instrumental in creating the conditions which made it possible, and by unwise legislation we have not only destroyed it, there will undoubtedly be periods of depression. The wave will sweep over us, and this nation is seated on a continent flanked by two great oceans. It is composed of men, the descendants of pioneers, in a sense, pioneers of men winnowed out from among the nations of the Old World by the energy, boldness and love of adventure found in their own eager hearts. Such a nation, so placed, will surely wrest success from fortune.

Great fortunes have been accumulated, and yet in the aggregate those fortunes are small indeed when compared to the wealth of the people as a whole. The plain people are better off than they have ever been before.

Reference to Trusts.

In my message to the present Congress at its first session I discussed at length the question of trusts, and how those great corporations commonly doing an interstate business, often with some monopoly, which are so popularly known as trusts. The experience of the past year has emphasized, in my opinion, the desirability of the steps I then proposed. A fundamental requisite of social efficiency is a high degree of individual energy and efficiency, but this is in nowise inconsistent with power to act in combination for aims which cannot be well achieved by the individual acting alone. A fundamental base of civilization is the involuntarily of property, but this is in nowise inconsistent with the right of society to regulate the exercise of the private powers of property, under the name of corporate franchises, in such a way as to prevent the misuse of these powers. Corporations, and especially combinations of corporations, should be managed under public regulation. Experience has shown that under our system of government the necessary supervision cannot be obtained by State action. It must, therefore, be achieved by national action. Our aim is not to do away with corporations, on the contrary, these big aggregators are an inevitable development of modern industrialism, and the effort to destroy them would be futile unless accomplished in ways that would work the utmost mischief to the entire body politic. We can do nothing of good in the way of regulating and supervising these corporations until we fix clearly in our minds and hearts that we are not attacking the corporations, but endeavoring to do away with any evils in them. We are not hostile to them, we are merely determined that they shall be so handled as to subserve the public good. We draw the line against misconduct, not against wealth.

Go With Caution.

In curbing and regulating the combinations of capital which are, or may become, injurious to the public, we must be careful not to stop the great engine of production, which has reduced the place which our country has won in the industrial world, not to strike down wealth with the result of closing factories and mines, of turning the wage-worker idle in the streets and leaving the farmer without a market for his crops.

The power of the Congress to regulate interstate commerce is an absolute and unqualified grant, and without limitations other than those prescribed by the constitution. The Congress had constitutional authority to make all laws necessary and proper for executing this power, and I am satisfied that this power has not been exhausted by any legislation now on the statute books. It is evident, therefore, that evils restrictive of commerce of both countries.

Reciprocity Treaties.

I hope soon to submit to the Senate a bill providing for the ratification of the convention with Great Britain has been concluded, which will be at once laid before the Senate for ratification, providing for reciprocal trade arrangements between the United States and Great Britain, and substantially the same as the convention formerly negotiated by the Secretary of State, Mr. Blaine. I believe reciprocal trade relations will be greatly to the advantage of both countries.

President Roosevelt then refers to the good results expected to follow the formation of the international tribunal at The Hague for the settlement of international disputes; the building of an isthmian canal, the Pacific cable, conditions in the Philippines, recent naval manoeuvres, and proceeding, says:

Need of a Navy.

There should be no halt in the work of building up the navy, providing every year additional fighting craft. We have deliberately made our own certain foreign policies, which demand the possession of a first-class navy. The Monroe doctrine should be treated as the card-

nal feature of American foreign policy, but it would be worse than idle to assert it unless we intended to back it up, and it can be backed up only by a thorough good navy. A navy is not a provocative of war. It is the surest guaranty of peace.

We must earnestly hope that this state of things may continue; and the way to insure its continuance is to provide for a thorough efficient navy.
