Jury Found for the Defendants in Slander Suit-Much Interest to Union Men.

William Smith had seen him after his matching machine with a wrench, for the purpose, as he believed, of preventing a substitute from working it. A strike had resulted from McKever's discharge. Edward Chandler and Alfred Puterlaugh gave evidence, and the plaintiff himself swore that when accused of taking a bolt from his machine to injure its usetulness he had requested to see it, and had been refused by William Smith, with the words, "This is not the last you'll hear of this." During the month following his discharge he had made only \$12. Later he earned from \$10 to \$18 a week. He did not know that his character had been injured by the Smiths' statements. In the strike that followed he acted on "picket." but got no pay therefor, as the strike was not authorized by Chicago headquarters. Samuel Moore, organizer for the union, also testified.

Justice Britton ruled that the remarks of the employers were "privileged;" and there was no slander, and on the question of malice alone the case was sent to the jury. Both counsel spoke strongly, and Justice Britton gave a very clear explanation of "absolute and qualified privilege." Malice, he said, was defined to be ill-feeling aside from the circumstances.

Desire to Have Dominion Grants Readjusted on the Basis of Present Population.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS COST MORE

ntario Asks That Her Subsidy Bo Increased by \$629,484-Total Request is \$1,258,835.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.-The case which the duties were transferred from the provinces to the Dominion, as well as certain other revenues, it was provided that the following sums should be paid yearly by the Dominion to the several provinces for the support of their governments and legislatures: Ontario, \$80,000; Quebec, \$70,000; Nova Scotia, \$60,000; New Brunswick, \$50,000. An annual grant in aid of each province was also to be made equal to 80 cents per head of the population as ascertained by the census of 1861, with a special provision in the cases of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The revenue of and New Brunswick. The revenue of the Dominion at the inception of Con-federation was \$13,716,786, of which 20 per cent, or \$2,753,906, went to the provinces for provincial purposes, 80 per cent, or \$10,962,880, going to the Dominion. To-day the Dominion reve-nue stands at \$58,050,790, but, while the increased tayation is paid by the the increased taxation is paid by the people of the provinces, and the increase of population imposes upon the provinces largely increased burdens, provinces largely increased burdens, no corresponding increase of subsidy has been granted to them, 71-2 percent, only, instead of 20 per cent, of the revenue of the Dominion, or \$4,402,098, going to the provinces, while, instead of 80 per cent, 921-2 per cent, or \$53,648,692, is retained by the Dominion Present Subsidies Inadequate.

The Premiers say that the yearly payments heretofore made by the Donion to the several-provinces have proved totally inadequate for the pur-poses intended, that the actual expenses of civil government and legislation in the several provinces greatly exceed the amount provided therefor by the act, and that the other expenditure necessary for these local purposes, which before Confederation was provided for out of provincial revenue, has largely increased since.

The Premiers therefore recommend the following proposal as a basis for a final and unalterable settlement of the amounts to be yearly paid by the Dominion to the several provinces for their local purposes and the support of their governments—and legislatures, viz.

Instead of the amounts now paid the sums hereafter payable yearly by Canada to the several provinces for the support of their governments and legislatures to be according to population, and as follows: Where the population is under 150,000, \$100,000; where the population is 150,000, but does not exceed 200,000, \$150,000; where the population is 200,000, but does not exceed 400,000, \$188,000; where the population is 400,000 but does not exceed 800,000, \$190,000; where the population is 800,000, but does not exceed 1,500,000, \$220,000; when the population exceeds 1,500,000, \$240,000.

New Method of Computing, Instead of an annual grant per head of population now allowed the annual payment hereafter be at the same rate of 80 cents per head, but on the population of each province ascertained from time to time by the last decennia census until such population exceeds 2,500,000; and at the rate of 60 cents per head for so much of said population as may exceed 2,500,000, the population as ascertained by the last decennial census to govern, except, as to British Columbia and Manitoba; and, as to these two provinces the population to be taken to be that upon which, under the respective statutes in that behalf the annual payments now made to them respectively by the Dominion are fixed intil the actual population, is by the ensus ascertained to be greater and hereafter the actual population to gov-

The Increases In order to place the provinces in a position to meet such increased expenditure, the annual per capita sub-sidy should be calculated according to the population of the several prov inces ascertained by the preceding decennial census, and upon this basis the
