CLOSURE. London, July 14.- The House of Commons, in committee, held an all-night session over the tithe rent charge rating bill, the second reading of which was carried on June 24, by a majority of 314 against 176. The government forced the clause through by means of the closure, and the bill finally passed through the committee, which rose at

4 o'clock. Sir Richard Webster, attorney-general, before the Venezuelan arbitration commissioners, concluded the presentation of the British case. He said it would be a death-blow to arbitration if the courts sanctioned such claims as advanced by Venezuela. The sessions of the commission were adjourned until Wednesday next.

SHIPWRECKS. Perth, Western Australia, July 14 .-The British ship City of York has been wrecked off Rottnest Island. Fifteen members of the crew, including the first officer and the boatswain, were saved, but the captain and several men are missing.

Falmouth, July 14.—Supt. Nisbett, of the wrecking companies, says: "In bringing the Paris to Falmouth she narrowly escaped a big Manacle rock. It was ebb tide, with a northerly wind blowing, which would naturally take getting nearer and nearer the Manacles, until within 400 yeards of them, whereas we ought to have been a mile to the southward. Things looked queer for a time, but we altered our tactics and cleared the rocks. From what I have seen during the past six weeks, I am confident some mysterious current draws the vessels towards the rocks. While working on the Paris we warned numberless vessels of the danger they were in.

SUBSTANTIAL PATRIOTISM. Madrid July 14 .- The cabinet has accepted the offer of the queen regent to

assist the finances of the country by giving up another two million pesetas of the civil list. The King of Spain, Alforso XIII., had a civil list, fixed by the cortes in 1886, of 7,000,000 pesetas, or \$1,400,000, exclusive of allow-ances to members of the royal family, the queen regent having the administration of the said sum until the said king becomes of age. The annual grant to the queen, as mother to the king, was fixed by the cortes, 1886, at 250,000 pesetas. The immediate successor was assigned 500,000 pesetas, and 250,000 to the second The parents of the late king, Queen Isabel and her husband, have an allowance of 1,650,000 pesetas, or \$210,000, and the four infantas, sisters, of 800,000 pesetas, \$160,000. The total amount of the civil list and allowances to the relatives of the late king was fixed by the cortes, 1876, at 10,000,000 pesetas, or \$2,000,000. It was recently reduced to 9, 500,000 pesetas, or \$1,900,000.

ZOLA HOLDS HIMSELF IN

RESERVE. Emil Zola is still in Paris, closely watching the Dreyfus affair. He is not in the best of nealth, having had a touch of some heart trouble, which his doctors are unable to relieve. During the closing stages of the trial he pur poses writing two or three powerful newspaper articles in his most vigorous style. "It is a significant fact," the novelist says, "that nobody any longer is trying to find proofs of Captain Dreyfus' innocence. They seek only proofs of his guilt." M. Zola intends to write later on, giving his impressions of England. The Pekin correspondent of the London Times says: An imperial edict has been issued denouncing the universal peculation in the collection of the Chinese revenue, and appealing for a ces-

sation of malpractices which are increasing the country's financial straits. The Berlin Reichsanzeiger publishes a decree issued by Dr. Struckman, president of the Rhine Province, at Aix-la-Chapelle, prohibiting the impor-tation of fresh beef. The decree is due to the fact that Belgium, having permitted the importation of live cattle from the United States for slaughter, the meat found its way across the Belgian frontier into Germany in contravention of the existing law against such importation.

# POLICE CIRCLES I ULIUL UINULLO

Sergeant Jenkins' Resignation Handed in to the Mayor.

Implied Charges Against the Chief and P. C. Egelton-An Investigation

Probable. Police circles were startled yesterday evening when it became known that the following letter had been handed to Mayor Wilson. The letter

explains fteelf: "London, July 18, 1899. "His Worship Mayor Wilson, Chairman Board of Police Commissioners: "Sir,-For the past 21 years I have been a member of the police force in this city, and for 14 years I have been one of the sergeants. For some time past the actions of Chief Williams and Police Constable Egelton towards me have been anything but pleasant, and of late have become so unbearable that I feel compelled to tender my resignation as sergeant and as a member of the police force. I therefore tender my resignation and ask to be relieved from duty at the expiration of one week. Will you kindly see that the amount to which I am entitled out of the police superannuation fund is paid to me? Yours respectfully,

"THOMAS JENKINS."

Sergeant Jenkins is one of the most popular men on the force, both with his fellow-officers and with the public generally. He has a splendid record as an upright, courteous, discreet and most efficient officer. Regret and astonishment are being expressed on all sides at the conditions which have led to so serious a step, and which may end in the entire disruption of the police force as at present constituted. It is understood that the trouble has been brewing for some time, and that Mr. Jenkins has not acted hastily. It is not improbable that a public investigation of Sergt. Jenkins' implied charges against Chief Williams and P. C. Egelton will be demanded.

Sergt. Jenkins is a native of London England. He served for a time in the millitia in England, and came to city while still a young man. In 1876, about the time the first horse care were run on the streets of London, he was an employe of the London street railway. He is a prominent Knight Templar and has many influential friends.
