### The Situation to Date.

The point at issue between the Com-pany and their former employees is very simple, yet very important.

The Company say in effect they are willing to accept a limited arbitration, but not a full arbitration.

The strikers say they are willing to accept a full arbitration—that is, an arbitration covering all points, past, present and future—but not a merely partial arbitration.

What is called the joint City Council and Citizens' Committee have been trying hard to lay down a basis for arbitration satisfactory to both parties. Probably the Committee made a mistake in attempting any such task. The chief function for which they were appointed we should rather take to be to get the opposing parties together in arbitration to settle the differences themselves, in the usual manner. Each side ought surely to be able to trust its own arbitrator.

For the Committee to attempt to eliminate this phase and that phase of the controversy from consideration, would be tantamount to deciding certain points in advance in favor of one of the parties. That would be arbitrating in advance of an arbitration!

Then, as to the selection of a third arbitrator. The men hold that each side should appoint one, and that these two should appoint a third; not that any other method should be adopted under which they could not be certain to have in the third arbitrator a man disinterested and uninfluenced, which they say is all they desire.

To omit the question of the recognition of the men in their collective capacity—to omit the question of wages—and to give the men no efficient say in the selection of the third arbitrator; in other words, to give the Company the whole thing in advance—that would be a funny sort of arbitration!

It seems to us the time has come when all little devices of sharp lawyering should be put to one side, and an arbitration entered into, full, fair and friendly, without quirks and reservations.

There are two attitudes of mind in which to approach the settlement of these difficulties. One is that of Plato—"for everybody is a good sort of fellow, when you know him." The other is that of aloofness and suspicion. The Maxim Gun is no remedy. Fair and friendly arbitration is.

The mere finding and publication of the joint City Council and Citizens' Committee will have no more influence on public opinion than a wind that blew a thousand years ago, except in so far as they are based on common sense. An arbitration that is not an arbitration would settle nothing.

LATER.

Since the above was written, we learn that the Company, not content with a suggested basis of arbitration which proposed to give them several points in advance, decline the proposals apparently because the Citizens' Committee did not suggest to give them more!

This attitude on the part of the Company only emphasizes the duty of the City Council, in open meeting, to insist on fair and full arbitration.

# Pro-Boer Agitation

Being Worked Up by the Fiery Afrikaners.

Breezy Session of the Cape Parliament Anticipated

Proposition to Impeach Premier Schriener Discussed.

Zola Has His Eagle Eye on the Dreyfus Affair.

Closure Used in Connection With the Tithe Rent Bill in the British House—Duke George's Death Due to a Bicycle Accident.

London, July 14.—Cape Town dispatches say that the Afrikaner party is working up a pro-Boer agitation, and doing its utmost in this direction. An attempt to hold a loyalist meeting at Worcester yesterday was frustrated by the Afrikaners, who precipitated disgraceful scenes, forcibly dragging loyalist speakers from the platform, and expelling them from the hall, amid jeers and insults. It is reported that several Dutch members of the legislature participated.

The publication of the text of the Transvaal franchise law, now being discussed at Pretoria, has accentuated the bitterness between the two elements. The military authorities at the Cape are purchasing horses, mules and wagons, and preparing to forward supplies to Kimberley.

The Volksraad at Pretoria adopted the preamble of the franchise law, which declares that the necessity exists for the immediate adoption of the law, thus avoiding the three months' previous publication required by the constitution. The discussion of the articles of the law is now in progress.

The Cape Parliament opens today, and exciting scenes are anticipated, owing to the attitude of the premier, Mr. W. P. Schriener, on the Transvaal question. A large number of the opposition members favor his impeachment.

**DUKE GEORGE'S DEATH.**  
Breslau, July 14.—The Schlesische Zeitung declares that the death of the czar's son, Grand Duke George, who passed away July 10, was due to a bicycle accident. While wheeling over the hilly country near Abbas Tuman, in the Caucasus, the paper adds, a mishap caused him such loss of blood that the grand duke died on the spot of the occurrence.

**CLOSURE.**  
London, July 14.—The House of Commons, in committee, held an all-night session over the tithe rent charge rating bill, the second reading of which was carried on June 24, by a majority of 314 against 176. The government forced the clause through by means of the closure, and the bill finally passed through the committee, which rose at 4 o'clock.

Sir Richard Webster, attorney-general, before the Venezuelan arbitration commissioners, concluded the presentation of the British case. He said it would be a death-blow to arbitration if the courts sanctioned such claims as advanced by Venezuela. The sessions of the commission were adjourned until Wednesday next.

**SHIPWRECKS.**  
Perth, Western Australia, July 14.—The British ship City of York has been wrecked off Rottnest Island. Fifteen members of the crew, including the first officer and the boatswain, were saved, but the captain and several men are missing.

Falmouth, July 14.—Supt. Nisbett, of the wrecking companies, says: "In bringing the Paris to Falmouth she narrowly escaped a big Manacle rock. It was ebb tide, with a northerly wind blowing, which would naturally take the vessel south, but we found her getting nearer and nearer the Manacles, until within 400 yards of them, whereas we ought to have been a mile to the southward. Things looked queer for a moment, but we altered our tactics and cleared the rocks. From what I have seen during the past six weeks, I am confident some mysterious current draws the vessels towards the rocks. While working on the Paris we warned numberless vessels of the danger they were in."

**SUBSTANTIAL PATRIOTISM.**  
Madrid July 14.—The cabinet has accepted the offer of the queen regent to assist the finances of the country by giving up another two million pesetas of the civil list. The King of Spain, Alfonso XIII., had a civil list, fixed by the cortes in 1886, of 7,000,000 pesetas, or \$1,400,000, exclusive of allowances to members of the royal family, the queen regent having the administration of the said sum until the said king becomes of age. The annual grant to the queen, as mother to the king, was fixed by the cortes, 1886, at 10,000,000 pesetas, or \$2,000,000. The immediate successor was assigned 500,000 pesetas, and 250,000 to the second sister. The parents of the late king, Queen Isabel and her husband, have an allowance of 1,650,000 pesetas, or \$330,000, and the four infantas, his sisters, of 800,000 pesetas, or \$160,000. The total amount of the civil list and allowances to the relatives of the late king was fixed by the cortes, 1876, at 10,000,000 pesetas, or \$2,000,000. It was recently reduced to 9,500,000 pesetas, or \$1,900,000.

**ZOLA HOLDS HIMSELF IN RESERVE.**  
Emil Zola is still in Paris, closely watching the Dreyfus affair. He is not in the best of health, having had a touch of some heart trouble, which his doctors are unable to relieve. During the closing stages of the trial he purposed writing two or three powerful newspaper articles in his most vigorous style. "It is a significant fact," the novelist says, "that nobody any longer is trying to find proofs of Captain Dreyfus' innocence. They seek only proofs of his guilt." M. Zola intends to write later on, giving his impressions of England. Although he is in much need of money he now refuses to accept any of the offers he has received, especially from America,

# VICTORY FOR THE MODERATES

Friendly Messages Between the Transvaal and the British Governments.

Volksraad's Franchise Proposals Approved—Minor Alterations Suggested and Accepted.

London, July 14.—The Digger News, the Boer organ in London, has received the following dispatch from Johannesburg, dated July 14:

"A cable dispatch from the British Government has been received by the Transvaal Government, conveying a cordial message of warm approval of the Volksraad's franchise proposals.

"The message also suggests minor alterations and tenders friendly advice.

"The Transvaal, in replying gratefully, accepts the suggestions, and consideration of the reform bill, now before the raad, has been deferred, in accordance with the British Cabinet's advice.

"As a result of this development the peace party has come out triumphant, and Lord Salisbury is acclaimed as the vindicator of the moderates."

# THE KOLAPORE CUP

Goes to the English Team—Canada a Close Second—Canadians Win the Colonial Prize of \$400.

Bisley, England, July 14.—In the contest for the Kolapore Cup, seven shots at 200, 500 and 600 yards, open to teams of eight, one team of volunteers from the mother country, one team from the militia or volunteers of each British colony or dependency, and one team from members of the India staff corps, India service or India volunteers at the end of the 200 yards shooting, today the scores were as follows: Mother country, 243; Canada, 240; Guernsey, 237; India, 236; Jersey, 229. The best Canadian score was that of Rennie, 32. Simpson, Ogg and Gilchrist each made 30.
