Hogs—The offerings were nominal, about 40 loads, and opened fairly active; heavy, \$4.05 to \$4.10; Yorkers, \$3.90 to \$3.95; pigs, \$3.85 to \$3.90; roughs, \$3.75 to \$3.80; \$4.25, \$2.75 offerings were well cleaned up at the close and steady.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—Beef—Receipts, 3,155 head; market very dull; top steers about steady; medium to fair, 10c to 11c lower; bulls steady; cows, 10c to 15c lower; steers, \$4.50 to \$5.65; oxen and stags, \$2.50 to \$3.70; bulls, \$3.25 to \$4.27; extra fat, \$4.60 to \$4.60; \$4.90, \$2.75 offerings were well cleaned up at the close and steady. Hogs—The offerings were nominal, about 40 loads, and opened fairly active; heavy, \$4.05 to \$4.10; Yorkers, \$3.90 to \$3.95; pigs, \$3.85 to \$3.90; roughs, \$3.75 to \$3.80; \$4.25, \$2.75 offerings were well cleaned up at the close and steady.

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—The small supply of cattle today was disposed of at generally unchanged prices; fancy cattle brought \$6 to \$6.50; choice, \$5.50 to \$5.90; bulls, \$5 to \$5.25; beef steers, \$4 to \$4.80; stockers and feeders, \$3 to \$4.80; hogs, \$3.75 to \$4.80; calves and heifers, \$3.20 to \$4; western fat steers, \$4.20 to \$5.25; Texas steers, \$3.75 to \$5.10; calves, \$4 to \$5.25. There was a good demand for hogs, and prices ruled stronger, with sales at \$3.25 to \$3.97; the great part selling at \$3.75 to \$3.90; pigs sold at \$3.50 to \$4.00, the heavier weights selling the highest. Trade in sheep was active at steady prices; inferior to prime sheep, \$2.50 to \$4.30; yearling wethers, \$4.20 to \$4.50; lambs, \$4 to \$5. Receipts: Cattle, 2,500; hogs, 29,000; sheep, 5,000.

TORONTO, Feb. 3.—An unusually heavy supply of cattle on the cattle market today resulted in prices weakening for the poorer grades, though for quality the prices remained firm. The deliveries of yesterday and today combined made a total of 155 loads. There were about 1,000 hogs and 500 sheep on the market. The best shippers and good butcher cattle—Choice, \$4.40 to \$4.80; light, \$4 to \$4.20. Bulls—Medium export, \$3.40 to \$4; heavy export, good quality, \$3.75 to \$4.
