GREYNA GREEN IS GROWING ANGRY

Clergymen Resent the Attacks of a Detroit Newspaper Re the Many Marriages There.

An editorial in the Detroit News-Tribune, headed "Marriage Brokers of Windsor," deserving of censure, brings some replies from Windsor clergymen.

"I think the question rests on the peculiar geographical situation of Windsor, and not on any tendency on the part of the clergymen toward a wholesale solemnization of marriages," said Rev. F. A. P. Chadwick, pastor of All Saints' Church. "If Windsor were not situated on the border and directly across from a large city like Detroit, the question would never have arisen, because most of the people who come to Windsor to be married are boarding and have no home in which to get married. Generally their parents are in some other part of the country, so that it is impossible to have them present. Of those who are boarding in Detroit, I think I am safe in saying that fully 50 per cent are from Canada. Time and again young couples come to me and say that they used to live in Canada and that they would not feel right if they were not married there."

"There is not more than one minister in Windsor who will marry a divorced person without an affidavit," said Rev. L. S. Huggins. "That is practically all there is to it. I always look into the marriages that I am asked to perform and it is very seldom that anyone under 20 years of age comes here to me. As to Windsor marriages in divorce courts, the trouble is that every time a couple who were married in Windsor ask for a divorce in Detroit courts, particular attention is called to it and it is given an undue amount of advertising."

Rev. O. H. McGowan, of the B. M. E. Church, struck the deapest note in the discussion and he said that a minister's moral obligation both to society and God should be taken into consideration.

"Supposing," he said, "that a young couple come to a minister from another part of the country and ask to be married. Possibly they have run away from home; but even if they have, what is a minister to do? Is he to send them away because they have not their parents' consent? Why, it looks very reasonable to me that if a young woman thinks enough of a man to leave home with him and the ministers refuse to marry them, that she will live with him anyway, and in that case I think that the minister did a far greater wrong than if he had married them and so allowed them to live together as man and wife."

CRUEL THANH THAI ABDICATES HIS THRONE

Paris, Sept. 5.—A dispatch received here from the governor-general of Indo-China, Thanh Thai, has abdicated in favor of his 8-year-old son, who now rules Annam with the aid of the regency, consisting of the council of ministers.

Thanh Thai was deposed by the French resident of Annam and interned in his palace at Hue July 30 last. This step on the part of the French authorities was taken only after a long series of atrocities committed by the king had made it impossible for him longer to remain on the throne.

MANY LOGS COME DOWN THE OTTAWA

Drive This Year Probably Will Include 8,000,000 Pieces.

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—According to a rough estimate made by the Upper Ottawa Improvement Company, the present drive of logs in the Ottawa River is in excess of that of other years. Owing to the large quantity of pulp wood which has been sent down the river during recent years, it is difficult to estimate exactly the quantity of lumber handled. Eight million pieces, including what was left over from last year, is given as the amount of this year's drive. Probably two million more pieces remain in the branch streams. The excess over last year is partly due to a larger cut in the forest and partly to the exceptionally heavy portion of last year's drive that remained in the river on account of low water.

The drive in Lake Temiskaming is finished, and on the whole the movement of logs is about as far advanced as was the case in other years. Two new steamers used for towing between Desjardins and Allumette Rapids drive greatly with that portion of the drive. There is an increased demand for logs at Pembroke, owing to the more extensive operations of the Colonial Lumber Company and the opening of the new mill at Pembroke by Barr & Morris.

In discussing the reason why there should be any shortage of logs, G. B. Greene, managing director of the improvement company, says the manufacturers had to depend on the way have at least two years' supply of logs ahead, which makes a big store of them in the river. Sometimes one man's logs come out all together, and block the way for those of someone else. The manufacturer who has a small quantity of logs is likely to fare worst, because his supply will get mixed in with the others and, naturally, cannot be delivered promptly.

The water in the Ottawa River is now a few inches higher than it was a year ago, despite the dearth of rain. This affords an advantage both for the driving of logs and cutting operations where power is supplied by waterfalls.

DIVISION COURT CLERKS

J. W. McIntosh, of This City, Is Vice-President of Association.

The annual meeting of the Division Court Clerks' Association of Ontario was held at the Parliament buildings, Toronto, yesterday. Mr. E. H. Duggan of Toronto, the president, occupying the chair. There was a large attendance, and the gathering was marked by considerable earnestness. The officers elected were: Mr. E. H. Duggan, president; J. W. McIntosh, first vice-president; J. W. McIntosh, second vice-president; Peter MacIntyre, Woodville, secretary.

A committee was appointed to wait on the Government with the request that something should be done to relieve the clerks of paying rent for their offices. This is done now out of the percentage of fees retained by the clerks, and in many cases, it is contended, it is a hardship.

HOOTED BY MOB

Merry Del Val, Papal Secretary, Has Stormy Trip.

Castel-Gandolfo, Sept. 4.—While Cardinal Merry del Val, the papal secretary of state, was driving to this place from Rome last evening, several men on a passing tramcar hooted him and shouted, "Death to the Pope!" "Down with the cardinal!" and gave utterance to curses and other insulting expressions.

The police, who were escorting the cardinal's carriage, stopped the tramcar and arrested the offenders, but only after a long and exciting struggle, in which friends of the demonstrators made attempts to rescue them from the police.

LONDON QUOTERS PLAYED FINE GAME

Last Day's Scores in the Victoria Tournament at Toronto.

Toronto, Sept. 5.—The second annual tournament of the Victoria Quoting Club came to a close yesterday afternoon, and was without doubt the best tournament ever held in the Dominion of Canada. The finest players in Canada were on deck, including some of the old war horses, such as Ralph Errington, of London, ex-champion of Canada, and Frank Claus, of Belleville, one of the best players in Canada. Although 80 years of age, he came in for the consolation prize.

John Talbot, of London, was another good player, although less fortunate than the rest, yet he played a great game. Among some of the younger players of note were Bob Callander, champion of Canada; Walter Carlyle, who played second to Callander two consecutive years; R. COMBAT WAGED O'ER LEADER'S BODY

Moors and French Legionnaires Were Engaged in Terrific Battle.

Paris, Sept. 5.—The Government today announced that it was convinced that the serious conflict in which eight Frenchmen were killed near Casablanca, occurred Tuesday, Sept. 3, and that Vice-Admiral Philbert's cable message of yesterday referred to the same engagement.

Major Provost, of the Foreign Legion, was killed in the thick of the fighting which raged at Sidi Moums; where the Moors attacked the French flying column, as it was returning from Limitell, where bands of the enemy had been dispersed. As the Moorish horde galloped to the strife, chanting hymns, the French lines were quickly formed to receive the shock. Major Provost, who was in front of his men, said "Courage, my children," and then turning once more to the battalion of the Foreign Legion, which he had led so long, the major cried, "Forward, my children, forward." At that moment, a bullet pierced Provost's heart.

The fighting then became desperate, the opposing Moors and Legionnaires saw-sawing backward and forward about the body of the major, the men of the Foreign Legion refusing to abandon their beloved commander.

Under the clash of bayonets and sword, when men were falling right and left, and the field was covered with riderless, maddened, wounded horses, the Legionnaires held their ground until they succeeded in carrying off the Provost's body. During the fighting the Moors succeeded in turning the French flank, but the reining General Druide turned the tide of battle, and the conflict became a shambles for the Moors.

THE "ALL RED" ROUTE

A London Dispatch Says It Is To Be Put Through.

London, Sept. 4.—Lord Strathcona states that he is entirely confident of the ultimate success of the "All Red" route. A steamship company has made a definite offer to undertake a fast Atlantic service for a subsidy of £500,000, whereof the Canadian Government is prepared to bear half. The scheme will make Halifax the chief point of entry for the express service between Europe and the North American continent. This will be good for Canada, and a great advantage to Britain. It is not believed the new route will be confined to passenger and express service. Lord Strathcona added he had had a splendid voyage. "The Oceanic is a fine boat," he said, "but we do want something a little faster."

The Chronicle, referring to the "All Red" route, says it can no longer be said that Canada is expecting the mother country to give her benefits without making an equivalent contribution here. The grant of £250,000 is a very large amount for a state whose revenue is £16,000,000.

A LAWYER FOR THE POOR

Charity Organization Will Try to Secure a Solicitor's Services.

At the monthly meeting of the Charity Organization and Humane Society held this morning in the city hall, a movement was made to secure the services of an honorary solicitor, who will, on behalf of the society, give legal counsel to poor people, who, in the discretion of the secretary, are in need of such advice and yet are unable to pay for it. This action is taken in view of the large number of immigrants who are constantly arriving in this city and who do not understand the laws of the country, particularly in regard to tenancy and are consequently often taken advantage of by unscrupulous persons.

A very pathetic case was this morning brought to the notice of the society's officers—that of a respectable-looking young Englishwoman, who has two small sick children in her home. The woman was in great distress because her landlady was demanding a month's rent a week before it was due, and the woman feared that if she did not meet the landlady's demand she would be turned out of her home. She left the society's office feeling much reassured and that she had friends who would see that she was not thus taken advantage of. The board feels that it is in the interest of the whole community that these people should be protected.

The secretary submitted a lengthy and interesting report of the society's work during the summer. It dealt with the details of eighteen of the more important cases, in which the needy have been visited and assisted, work found for the unemployed and reports of begging thoroughly investigated.

The president and Mr. J. S. Pearce were appointed a committee with power to select and purchase a drinking fountain from the catalogues submitted, for which purpose money was bequeathed to the society some time ago.

As this was the first meeting since June a large amount of routine business was transacted. There was a very good attendance, and the president, Mr. H. E. Gates, occupied the chair.

SULLIVAN IS CRAZY

Noted New Yorker's Mind Is Gone and Death Is Close.

New York, Sept. 4.—Florrie Sullivan, Tammany leader of the eighth assembly district, returned from a health-seeking trip to Europe in such bad shape mentally that he will never be able again to cast a vote in his political balliwick. He went stark mad on Monday morning when the Kronprinz Wilhelm, on which he was a passenger, was within 700 miles of this port, and made an effort to jump into the sea. He has been under constant surveillance from the moment he boarded the ship at Bremen. He tried to toss his suitcase overboard, but it was snatched away from him.

Judge Josephs found him in a sanitarium at Frankfurt-on-the-Main in bad physical and mental shape. He was then perfectly docile, however, and was willing to accompany the judge back to America.

Sullivan is the man who cleaned up the "red light" region by the power of his good right fist. He has been pronounced an incurable parrot and his days are numbered. He may live a few weeks, he may linger for a year or more, but that is all.
