> Sketch of a Noble and Useful Life - 82 Years of Age.

At noon today there passed away, at her home, 449 Horton street, Mrs. Ann

Martindale, one of the cidest and most beloved residents of London. The deceased was born in Weardale, County of Durham, England, on the 1st of June, 1824, and hence her 82nd birthday was celebrated only last week. Her father was the Rev. George Watson, of Linga Riggs, Weardale, and a preacher of high local repute, being accustomed to make use of the most was a member of the choir in High House Church-a Wesleyan Church, even now famous among those of that faith, from the fact that a thorn tree yet standing in the church grounds once formed a canopy and shelter under which the saintly John Wesley preached his first open-air sermon in that section. In the choir of that church she made the acquaintance of Joseph Martindale, who was in his day and generation a musician of commanding ability, and largely through his means the choral singing was strengthened by the addition of an orchestra, consisting of clarinets, orpheclides, trumpets, violins, 'cellos and flutes, and the fame of the choir spread for many miles throughout the County of Durham. Joseph Martindale and "Nannie" Watson, as she was called, were married in High House Church in 1844. In 1853 the young family set sail from Liverpool in the good ship "Sarah Jane" for New York, a city in the then land of great promise. Six weeks and three days were required to complete the passage, as the vessel encountered a succession of fierce gales, and after them followed provoking calms. Four children had been born to them before they left the heather-covered hills of Weardale, and these rosy cheeked and rugged youngsters-Thomas, George,


